THE CAPITALISTIC SYSTEM.

The services rendered by the so-called capitalistic system of economics, has been the subject of much discussion at the convention of the American Bankers' association just held at Chicago. The bankers rightly feel that people who believe in the institution of private property must show that it renders service to the public. The effort is being made to show that the capitalistic system condemns the masses to unremitting toil with little hope for the future. The people who have accumulated property must show that the community has gained benefits from these accumulations, or they will not be tolerated. Rightly looked at, property is simply a reward given for special efficiency in service. The person who can produce some article at less expense than others, or make a better one, is able to build up a fortune. The community is much better off after he has made his fortune than if he had never conducted these operations. They would not have bought these articles of him and thus helped mass his wealth, unless it was for their advantage to do so. The question between a property holding system and a socialistic one, is essentially this, whether we shall or shall not reward special efficiency by allowing efficient persons to accumulate wealth. It is a difference between rewarded and unrewarded production. The rewards may sometimes seem too large. But if the community fails to allow that reward, a vast amount of energy would never be manifested, and the world would sink into a dull rut of non-achievement. The masses of the people would be far worse off than they are now. But the people who have gained these rewards should realize that the public has offered them for service rendered, and they should make it very apparent, by their generosity and public spirit, that they wish to make return for the opportunities they have had.

In the older days of politics, a campaigner thought he was doing a real stunt when he addressed three rallies a day. Campaign meetings were heavy and formal lectures in those times, when serious citizens would give up many hours to attending political meetings. In these days of abundant amusements, candidates find it harder to get an audience. They must trap the voter in his lair, and often catch him at factory gates or other places where people congregate. Some of these audiences may be small, but by the whirlwind tour plan, the modern candidate plans to make his voice reach more hearers than ever before. Col. Roosevelt, for instance, is trying to make 135 speeches in 18 days in his New York state campaign. Such a campaign puts a strain on a candidate unknown in earlier days. Not merely must a man have a throat seasoned for all weathers, but he must throw enthusiastic vitality into his personal manner, or his hearers will be repelled rather than attracted.

Many people feel they get a better idea of the merits of a political candidate by seeing him and hearing him talk, than by reading his printed addresses. There may be something in that idea. A man may have successfully covered his tracks so that no trace appears in the existing records of any mistakes or wrong purposes. Yet he has created a record of his career in his facial characteristics, which acute observers can read correctly and which reveals his real deficiencies. Or a man's transparent honesty and executive ability may appear in his open and alert countenance. The time spent at political rallies is then not lost. People who attend them regularly acquire a useful background of political insight.

BONDS FOR GERMAN LOAN BEING SOLD

NEW YORK, Oct. 14.—Sale of America's share of the bonds comprising the \$200,000,000 German reconstruction loan begins this morning at 10 o'clock. This country's allotment is \$110,000,000. The rest of the bonds will be marketed in Great Britain and other participating nations almost simultaneously with the offering in this country.

Simultaneous with the announcement by the Morgan syndicate that the bonds were ready, Mayor Hylan wrote his third letter to President Coolidge relative to the loan, again calling upon the president to inform the investing public whether or not the word of the bankers was the only assurance investors had of the ultimate collection of the monies. Asserting there were hints in the statements of the bankers indicating that arms might be used to collect the debt if necessary, Mayor Hylan questioned the readiness of the allies to go to war to collect American money for American investors and asked if our own armed forces would be used.

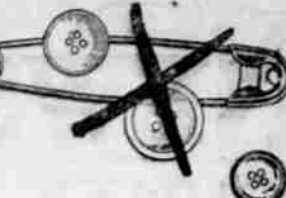
SAWDUST WILL BE LEFT ON GRIDIRON

(Associated Press Leased Wire)

COVALLIS, Oct. 14.—Officials of Oregon Agricultural College football team, announced today that they had definitely decided that sawdust would not be removed from Multnomah field at Portland, as demanded by the University of Southern California for the scheduled game next Saturday between the two teams. This was the answer to notification from the southern team that the game would be off unless the sawdust was removed.

The Oregon Agricultural college officials stated their position to be that the sawdust had been used on the field for years, that the University of Southern California, have played here under similar conditions on former games, and that the southern team has a heavier line than the Argie and would have the advantage on the sawdust field; and that there are intercollegiate games scheduled for Wednesday, Thursday and Friday at the field, the sawdust could not be removed in time for the game Saturday, and if it were removed and there should be a rain the field would be muddy.

ANNEXATION PLAN BRINGS PROTESTS

Inquiry at the mayor's office this morning brought out the fact that so far no formal request for annexation of Edenhower had been presented to the city, but it developed that there had been some conversation concerning the proposal.

Some of the Edenhower people interviewed today stated they did not care to come into the city at present. Others said they did not want any city government, as they were getting along well enough as it is, and they believed in letting well enough alone.

These were of the opinion that if it became necessary to incorporate that they favored a separate municipality, and then they would not have to shoulder any part of the bonded indebtedness of the city, but court start out in the city business with a clean slate and be responsible only for their own debts that might be contracted for street improvement, sewerage or water or sidewalks.

In this connection the attitude of Edenhower a few years ago was recalled, when, before the state went dry, when local option prevailed, that Edenhower asked to be incorporated, and the request was turned down cold.

Those were in the days when Roseburg had gone dry, and some of the thirsty ones who were compelled to travel to Sutherlin, the nearest resort where liquid refreshments in ample quantities could be legally had, to get a drink of the cup that cheers, conceived the plan of making a town of Edenhower in order that burning throats could be cooled on shorter notice. A nice little place was built—a sort of haven for weary motorists, and everything rocked and primed for the admission of Edenhower to the statehood of cities. But a heartless county court sat down upon all dreams of the kind and left Edenhower without an irrigating fountain and as dry as Death Valley.

Since then, until now, there has been no desire to assume the responsibilities of a city, and the residents of the beautiful suburbs to the north of the town still want to maintain their quiet and quiet ways, happy in their environment.

Published reports of the plan that has been discussed for annexing Riverside, Edenhower and Jones Addition to the city of Roseburg have brought mild protests from some residents of those subdivisions, who allege that they are very well satisfied with present conditions, and state that they do not want to become a part of the incorporation.

A remonstrance has been put in motion and many of the resident taxpayers of Riverside, Edenhower and Jones Addition have signed the objection, which will be presented to the Roseburg council if it appears necessary to do so in order to stop the annexation process.

ILLINOIS HEARS DAVIS SPEECHES

Tariff Act Said to Be Criminal Imposition on the People of U. S.

STATES LABOR CREED

Democratic National Committee Flays Mellon, Charging He Received Favors From Govt.

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)

DAVIS TRAIN, Enroute Springfield, Ill., Oct. 14.—John W. Davis, democratic presidential candidate left Indiana today and campaigned his way through southern Illinois. He carried with him across the Wabash, however, hope of victory which he admitted he did not feel when he entered Indiana and which he said had sprung up to absolute confidence during his travels in that state.

In his appeal to Unionists in Terre Haute, Mr. Davis restated his labor creed—equal rights to all men and special privileges to none—and left his promise to "hold the scales of justice fair and equal between every man, woman and child."

In speeches last night at Terre Haute and in the afternoon at La Fayette Crawfordville, Green Castle and Lebanon, Mr. Davis recounted the record of the republican administration as he saw it and pressed hard his attacks upon the Fordney McCumber tariff act, the conduct of foreign affairs and the administration of the department of justice under former Attorney General Daugherty.

The tariff act, Mr. Davis said, was a "criminal imposition on the people of the United States."

The indictment of Senator Burton K. Wheeler, Senator La Follette's running mate, Mr. Davis said, was "as black and as dastardly a crime as could be committed by any man."

This thrust the candidate aimed particularly at the former attorney general, whose agents, he charged, together with those of the secretary of the republican national committee, put on foot and procured at a joint conference, the indictment of the Montana senator.

The attitude of the American government toward Europe, for which Mr. Davis blames Secretary of State Hughes, was described as one of perfect willingness to cooperate, "provided our willingness never lends us in to cooperation."

WASHINGTON, Oct. 14.—The Aluminum company of America, owned principally by Secretary Mellon and his brother, R. B. Mellon of Pittsburgh, was declared by Representative Jeffers of Alabama, in a statement made public by the democratic national committee, "not only to have been the beneficiary of special favors through tariff legislation, but in June, 1923, to have received an allowance of \$15,589,614.39 as settlement of an amortization claim."

"And this vast allowance, which was finally granted to Mr. Mellon's company," Mr. Jeffers said, "is a different amount and as a matter of fact, a great deal larger than the sum first estimated to be due to the Aluminum Company of America as amortization."

Charging that the Aluminum company, owned chiefly by the Mellon's, "is the recipient and beneficiary of special favors at the hands of the present administration," Mr. Jeffers added:

"It is an improper state of affairs where an individual having claims against the government for such vast amount is himself at the head of the department which handled such claims. In so doing, Secretary Mellon is as devoid of ethics as would be a judge sitting upon a case in which he had a personal interest and especially in a department where any favoritism in the handling of cases in that department is completely surrounded and protected by the wall of absolute secrecy which has covered all transactions within that particular department."

NEED NEW SCHOOL BUILDING IS SHOWN

The imperative need of additional school facilities, is plainly shown by the monthly report compiled by City Superintendent M. S. Hamm. The local schools have the highest enrollment at the present time that they have ever had. In the year 1919-1920 the enrollment at the end of the third week was 982, in 1920-21 it was 1,085; in 1921-22, 1,121; in 1922-23, 1,233-24, 1,240; and in 1924-25 it is 1,378. In the past six years the schools have had an increase of 396 pupils, and during that time nothing has been done to provide additional accommodations, and consequently the buildings are overcrowded. It has been necessary to rent outside accommodations to take care of the surplus of first graders. The Catholic school building has been leased, and is known as the Central school. Three additional teachers were necessary this year to properly handle the large number of new students.
