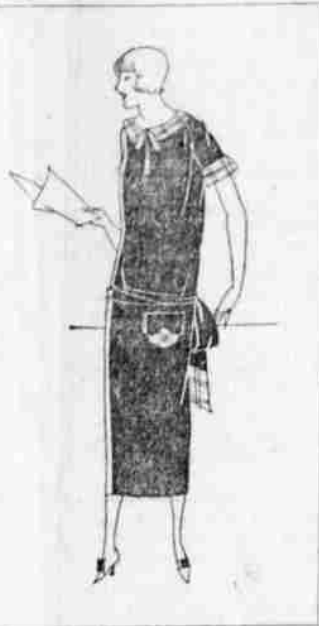

LA FOLLETTE TO SHOW MISSOURI

Appeal to the Farmer Will Be Made in St. Louis Speech Tonight.

HITTING 'SLUSH FUND'

Declares He Has New Evidence Tending to Show G. O. P. Trying to Buy Election.

(Associated Press Leased Wire.) ST. LOUIS, Oct. 14.—Crossing into Missouri, during the night, Senator Robert M. La Follette, independent candidate for president, arrived here today for his second campaign speech west of the Mississippi river. He speaks tonight in the coliseum.

What he will stress in his address here are not known, but he has indicated he will continue to discuss the problem of the American farmer, as he did in Kansas City last night.

Announcement was made here on behalf of Senator La Follette that evidence of a "new and startling character" in connection with his charge that the republican national committee was seeking to raise a "slush fund" to buy the election in doubtful states was in the possession of the La Follette-Wheeler forces.

Appalling to the farmers of the west to support his independent candidacy for the presidency, Senator La Follette in an address last night outlined the program for relief of agriculture which he would sponsor if elected.

The Wisconsin senator declared he would give support to the following measures:

Emergency legislation embodying the people of agricultural equality which he said included:

both the McNary-Haugen and the Norris-Sinclair bills.

"Genuine" farmer representation in the cabinet and on the federal reserve and farm loan boards, the tariff and interstate commerce commissions and their governmental bodies.

Repeal of the transportation act of 1920 and immediate freight rate reductions to approximately pre-war levels on agricultural products, livestock and upon materials and implements required upon American farms.

Revision of the federal reserve system "so as to remove its control from the hands of private monopoly and insure an effective voice in its management for the users of credit—the farmers, merchants, manufacturers and employees—on an equal footing with the bankers who sell the people's credit."

Reduction in the price of fertilizer by governmental development of the phosphate shale project and similar water power resources now under the control of the federal government.

Sweeping investigation within the department of agriculture and other executive departments, "to locate and remove every employee who owes his present position to the influence of the packers, the railroads and other privileged groups."

Senator La Follette explained that he believed the McNary-Haugen and Norris-Sinclair bills require amendment to render it certain that the farmer shall be the real beneficiary of the legislation.

"The packers and other interests," he added, "are always in wait as they were during the war, to seize the advantages of the laws designed to benefit the farmers."

REPARATIONS PLAN A PEACE SECURITY

(Associated Press Leased Wire.) LOUISVILLE, Ky., Oct. 14.—Belief was expressed by Charles G. Dawes, republican candidate for vice-president in a luncheon address here today, that the reparations settlement plan, now fully established, "will prove the fundamental enduring Christian peace in Europe and in the world."

"The experts' plan was a very stiff dose of the medicine of common sense," Mr. Dawes declared. Adding that it had been finally adopted not because of the ability of the men who drafted it, and not because it was a workable plan, but because Europe after five years, reached a realization that "political" demagogues could not solve her problems.

Mr. Dawes made his statement regarding the plan that bears his name—the most extended discussion of the proposal that he has permitted himself to make—in the course of what he described as a "non-partisan treatment of our present economic problems." Before an audience that included both democrats and republicans.

He made no claim that the Dawes settlement was an achievement to the credit of the republican party and likewise declared it was not an American effort altogether, but the group accomplishment of a body of business men of the interested nations and the United States who forgot politics and refused to listen to the demagogues.

"Europe had been listening for five years to the international demagogues who were appealing through oratory to the passions and prejudices of the people," he said. "Why was the plan as finally worked out adopted? It was not altogether because it was a workable plan. The proposal had the advantage of being worked out by a distinguished group of business men, but that wasn't enough."

"Its adoption came through frank admission that no help was to be expected from the demagogues and through the realization that unless common sense was crowned king, Europe would fall into the abyss."

Mr. Dawes said he believed there was a decadence of demagoguery in progress in the United States; attacked those political leaders regardless of party, who preached insistent doctrines and declared that American people were ready to give their support to the leaders who can stand the test.

WILL SIFT DOWN BASEBALL SCANDAL

(Associated Press Leased Wire.) NEW YORK, Oct. 14.—Sparks from the bomb thrown into baseball by Cozy Dolan and Jimmy O'Connell, for attempted bribery will probably be stamped out separately and with deliberation during the winter said Commissioner Landis.

"The investigation is still being conducted," Judge Landis said last night before leaving here for Chicago. "I won't say whether or not I'm satisfied how far I've gone already. The future will tell that."

Other trails broken during the exploration of the Dolan-O'Connell expose and which may be followed by the commissioner, include charges made by Dan Johnson, Barney Dreyfuss, and "Red" Dooin, former catcher.

Johnson's allegation went back into the world series of 1903, when he asserted that Lou Criger, a catcher had been approached by gamblers. Dreyfuss accused Cozy Dolan of tampering with "Pie" Traynor, Pirate third baseman. Dooin declared that a former catcher of the Giants had offered him a \$10,000 bribe.

Johnson and Dreyfuss have threatened to force an investigation of the separate threads and many well known sporting writers encourage a complete inquiry for the good of the game.

CHICAGO, Oct. 14.—After delaying his departure three hours to dance with nearly all of three score society women at an exclusive dinner party at the Saddle and Cycle Club, Edward Albert, Prince of Wales, left for Detroit on a special train at 5:35 a. m. today.

Smiling and affable but tired after nearly twenty hours of constant activity, the heir to the British throne was driven directly from the club to the private car of Sir Henry Thornton, president of the Grand Trunk Railway attached to the special, which had been held at the prince's request.

The guest list at the party at which Mrs. Howard Linn was hostess and Volcott Blair, a personal friend of the prince, was lost, was restricted to 108 young and middle aged people. The prince danced first with Mrs. Linn and during the evening at least once with a number of others.

The party concluded the strenuous visit of the prince, whose progress throughout the city during the day had been halted by outbursts of wild enthusiasm that several times threatened to overwhelm his highness and his hosts.

Once the surging crowds at the field museum brushed aside the police lines and the prince's party was pushed and jostled in the eagerness to view the royal visitor. In the melee the prince picked up a small boy from the floor and saved him from being trampled.
