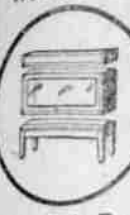

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## MASS MEETING AT MOOSE HALL

LaFollette - Wheeler Platform Upheld by Orator From New York.

ATTENDANCE IS GOOD

Crowd Vigorously Applauds Statements of Speaker as He Flays Coolidge.

"The most important issue in this campaign is the issue of clean government," declared Paul Blanshard of New York City, in an address last night in behalf of the LaFollette-Wheeler ticket.

"The republican party," he said, "is deliberately using the constitution as a smoke screen to conceal the fact that there has been more corruption in government during the last administration in American history. President Coolidge cannot escape the stain of this corruption because he does nothing aggressive and convincing to expose it. It is not enough to have a president who is silent in the face of corruption. Silence is not what we want. Coolidge has never denounced the moral turpitude of Denby and Daugherty; he dismissed them apologetically and feebly like an old man who was compelled to act by the anger of the people."

"LaFollette has been attacked because he wishes to modify the power of the supreme court to declare laws unconstitutional. What LaFollette wants to do is to restore the legislative power of congress which has been taken away from it by the supreme court without any sanction in the constitution. He proposes a series of constitutional amendments which would give the people more power over their own affairs. He wants us to have direct election of our president, a referendum on war except in case of actual invasion, direct election of federal judges and the abolition of the right of judges to send laboring men to prison under an injunction without trial by jury. Is there anything dangerous in these proposals? LaFollette also proposes to give congress power to pass a law over the veto of the supreme court if the reasons advanced by the supreme court for declaring that the law is unconstitutional do not appear convincing. This does not mean that congress can pass any law it chooses to pass. The members of congress have sworn to uphold the constitution and their oath is just as good as the oath of a supreme judge. In England the members of the House of Commons don't need any supreme court judge to help them interpret the constitution. Congressmen can read and write. Congressmen wrote the constitution in the first place. Congressmen represent the people while the supreme court is chosen indirectly from aged lawyers. Moreover the record of the supreme court in destroying some of the most humane acts of congress by decisions of 5 to 4 has convinced progressive thinkers that judges should not be given such power over legislation."

"The record of Robert M. LaFollette is a record of forty years of consistent and fearless public service. He has been attacked for opposing the declaration of war but when America entered the war he voted for as many military appropriations as any man in congress. And when the soldiers came back from the trenches Coolidge gave them words while LaFollette fought for the bonus."

"LaFollette has the experience and the courage to put his campaign promises into effect if you elect him. His record is a record of kept promises."

The meeting at which Mr. Blanshard spoke was very well attended, and the crowd vigorously applauded many of the remarks of the speaker, who was an orator of more than ordinary ability. Mr. Blanshard left this morning for Eugene, where he spoke to University students today.

### INSPECTS HOME

Col. B. K. Cash, national inspector of soldiers' homes, was in Roseburg today inspecting the state institution located here. Mr. Cash is from Dayton, Ohio, and has visited practically all of the homes for veterans in the country. The Oregon State Soldiers home is in very good condition, he reports. He inspected it thoroughly and in comparison with other institutions it is in excellent shape. He found the residents of the home contented and comfortable.

## SPAUGH ESTATE IS VALUED AT \$25,000

Administration of the estate of the late John T. Spaugh was entered in the county court today and the will filed for probate. Mrs. Myrtle B. The five children, one living at Marshfield, Ore., at Eugene and two in Roseburg, were all remembered in the will, each receiving legacies, but the bulk of the property goes to the widow, Julia C. P. Hopkins is attorney for the estate, and the business of settling up the affairs of the deceased will be expedited. The properties are all clear and income bearing.

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## MARKETS

PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 15.—Sharp advances were scored in the local egg market today, following the rise in other coast markets since the opening of the week. Fresh stocks are very scarce now with production considerably lower at this time. Outside markets are soaring and the shipping demand is brisk. Another factor is the government report on storage holdings of eggs throughout the country which is considered bullish. Local dealers are opposed to any runaway market but are frank to admit that further gains are likely before the present advancing movement has spent itself. The country dressed veal market is badly demoralized today. Good calves were selling at 11 cents with 12 cents the extreme top on fancy stuff. Receipts along the coast are not so heavy but the liberal receipts at the yards is cutting in on the market as the butcher trade is pretty well filled up. Choice light pork is steady at 13 to 13 1/2 cents. Little change is shown in the poultry market. Supplies are liberal and the demand slow, but prices are still holding around 12 to 13 cents on light hens and 21 to 22 cents for heavier. Light springs bring as high as 21 and 25 cents. Heavy springs not wanted. Turkeys plentiful and slow at 25 cents top for live and 32 cents for dressed. The butter market is steady and unchanged. Grape juice at the Overland orchards, cutters only. Send your containers in advance.
