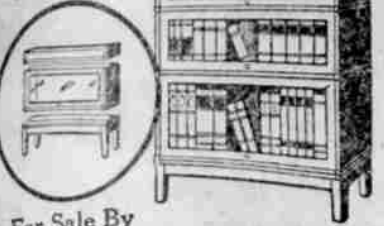

POLICY OF G. O. P. IS SAID RUINOUS

**La Follette Flays Federal
Reserve Board, Blaming
It for Farm Prices.**

PEEVED AT THE RADIO

**Is Hostile Because Radio
Station in Des Moines
Failed to Broadcast
His Speech.**

DES MOINES, Oct. 16.—Sen-
ator Robert M. La Follette, left
here early today to carry his
fight for the presidency into the
state of Minnesota. He speaks to-
night in Minneapolis, and then
will swing into South Dakota for
a campaign speech tomorrow
night in Sioux Falls.

It appeared probable today that
in both of these addresses the in-
dependent candidate for president
would discuss the problems of the
farmer, as he did here last night
to an audience which filled the
coliseum, the largest auditorium
in Des Moines.

Mr. La Follette renewed his
charge that the federal reserve
board in conspiracy with New
York and Chicago bankers, put in-
to effect a deflation policy four
years ago which proved ruinous
to American agriculture. The
board, he declared, has "worked
hand in glove with Wall Street
to exploit the farmer and the pro-
ducer."

Before leaving Des Moines,
Senator La Follette issued a state-
ment in which he declared that
the broadcasting station WHIO,
owned by the Bankers' Life Insur-
ance company of Des Moines, re-
fused to broadcast the meetings of
the progressives here last night.

"I am informed," he continued,
"that this station has heretofore
broadcast the meetings of both
the democratic and republican
parties."

"This broadcasting station has
a monopoly of the broadcasting
from this city under a license is-
sued by Herbert Hoover, but
dominated by the officers of the
American Telephone and Tele-
graph company and its affiliated
corporations which own the basic
patents upon which the radio in-
dustry is founded."

"The radio is rapidly becom-
ing a most important means of
communication and of dissemina-
tion of news and intelligence. It
is unthinkable that this artery of
communication should be con-
trolled by a private monopoly."

In his address last night, Sen-
ator La Follette pledged himself
if elected, to make banking cred-
it "the servant of the people,
rather than its master." He said
he would bring this about by pro-
viding for the organization of
"genuine" cooperative banks and
by taking steps to either have the
federal reserve banking system
"perform the functions it was
promised to perform when enact-
ed or have it wiped from the sta-
tute books."

In addition, he said, legislation
is needed to control interest rates,
to prevent usury and to insure
the use of the people's own credit
by the people on reasonable
terms.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 16.—Sec-
retary Hoover today disclaimed
responsibility for the failure of a
Des Moines, Iowa, radio station,
to broadcast an address by Sen-
ator La Follette, the independent
candidate for president, last night.

The secretary declared that the
station against which Senator La
Follette complained was owned
by individuals in Des Moines and
"has no monopoly as anyone else
can exert one and there who likes."
No other political party, he added,
has asked anything like the special
arrangements sought by the
