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WHOLESALE PRICES SHOWING DECREASE

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)
WASHINGTON, Oct. 16.—Wholesale commodity prices in September showed slight decreases from the August level. Information gathered in representative markets by the bureau of labor statistics of the department of labor, became the weighted index number, covering 404 commodities, from 149.7 for August to 148.8 for last month.

Decreases in farm products, clothing materials, fuel and metals were chiefly responsible for the drop in the general price level, the figures show.

Among the farm products also there were substantial reductions in cattle, sheep, cotton, cottonseed, flax seed, hay and potatoes. These decreases, despite increases in grains, hogs, and wool, caused the farm products level to recede 1.5 percent.

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DAVIS DEPLORES LACK EFFICIENCY

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)
QUINCY, Ill., Oct. 16.—Continuing his attacks "on the lack of efficiency, coordination and harmony that has prevailed in the national government," John W. Davis, democratic presidential candidate, appealed to voters here today upon his arrival from Springfield and pledged that if they would vote the democratic ticket in November that party "would hold the scales of justice and administration even."

At Hannibal, Missouri, the candidate was greeted by the first crowd of the day. He paid a tribute to Champ Clark's memory and declared "that patriot and statesman" if he were alive today, "would denounce the corruption that has appeared in the national government in the last three and one half years."

"With what satire," Mr. Davis, referring to Champ Clark, "would he point out the lack of efficiency and coordination and harmony that has prevailed in the national government during that time. And with what burning eloquence he would point again to those principles of the democratic government and popular liberty that his party and my party and the party of all democrats have stood for for 130 years."

"With my soul I wish Champ Clark were with us today and I pay on this soil a reverent tribute to his memory as that of a great man and a great patriot."

Mr. Davis said at Hannibal that he was proud to stand on the spot that produced Mark Twain. "It is not given to every city," he said, "to produce a man known wherever the English language is spoken and who by his philosophy and humor has brightened and gladdened and inspired the lives of thousands of men."

BORAH TO PROBE CAMPAIGN FUNDS

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)
CHICAGO, Oct. 16.—Preparations for "an exhaustive inquiry into campaign contributions and expenditures" were made today by Senator Borah of Idaho, chairman of the senate committee on campaign expenditures.

Senator Borah, called from a campaign tour in the west by the charges of Senator La Follette, independent presidential candidate, that improper and unwarranted use of money had become a factor in the campaign in certain states said upon his arrival here that "every line of inquiry will be followed to the end, that as far as possible all avenues of all campaign funds may be revealed."

Senator Borah who expected to confer first with his colleagues on the committee hoped to begin formal hearings tomorrow. Chairmen of the national committees of the republican and democratic parties, and John M. Nelson, national director of the La Follette campaign have been requested to submit formal detailed reports for the examination of the committee. These reports Senator Borah expected would be accomplished by statements from the campaign managers. After an examination of such reports and statements as may be submitted the committee will determine the future scope of inquiry, probably basing its determination upon leads suggested by the reports.

Toussing upon the La Follette charges, Senator Borah said that if any evidence were offered by the La Follette forces, it would be received by the committee.
