GATEWAY TO CRATER LAKE.

Each succeeding year evidences the fact that this county should have a gateway to Crater Lake National Park. Published figures of thousands of visitors to this popular resort should be a strong incentive to use every legitimate means possible to further a good roadway to the lake, and this should be done in an aggressive manner. Roseburg should be awake to the fact that tourist travel is a real asset to the community, and the longer the delay in getting a road from this county to Crater Lake the greater the loss in a financial way.

It is shown by reports just made public on travel to the lake this year that the city of Medford profited most, 35,593 people having passed through that city to visit one of the important scenic wonders of the world. Had this county been aggressive long ago and initiated a constructive program of road building to Crater Lake, it would now be receiving great profits from tourist travel; the thousands entering the park by way of Medford would naturally take advantage of an outlet to this city, in place of doubling back to that place, thereby giving Roseburg the same advantage from the standpoint of tourist travel as enjoyed by the southern city.

Complete data just compiled at headquarters in Crater Lake National Park shows that travel again shattered all previous records. Up to the evening of September 30th, 64,312 visitors entered the gates as against 52,017 for the preceding year, an increase of over 23 1-2 per cent. Every state in the union was represented with the lone exception of Georgia. Foreign countries were represented by visitors from Mexico, Canada, Cuba, Japan, Holland, New Zealand, Austria and Australia; also the territories of Hawaii and the Philippines. One of the notable features of the season was the great influx of Californians, comprising 21,319 of first entry travel. Oregon led California by the slight margin of 3,825. In total travel, including visitors who returned to the park one or more times, Oregon naturally shows a greater lead over California, in the proportion of 25,515 to 22,379.

The west entrance by way of Medford led in popularity, registering a total of 35,593, an increase of over 14 per cent. The south entrance followed with 22,860, an increase of over 40 per cent. Because of the poor approach roads south out of Bend, the east entrance travel this year fell to a total of 2,250 visitors. The balance of travel was distributed between the night checking station at Anna Spring and travel from Diamond Lake. Increase in travel to and from Diamond Lake was so great that it is expected that a ranger station will be erected on that road before the opening of the 1925 season. Analysis of travel figures show that 2,973 visitors came from east of the Rocky mountains. The state of Washington was represented by 2,799 to Crater Lake, as opposed to 7,625 Oregonians who visited Washington's masterpiece, Mount Rainier. Over 99 per cent of Crater Lake visitors came in their own automobiles, the balance by stage. A large majority brought camping equipment, taking advantage of the numerous and large camp grounds.

Crater Lake's percentage of increase is especially pleasing this year because many western recreational grounds suffered declines this year. Its popularity becomes more impressive when it is realized that the lake is located near no large centers of population and its attendance is not thus swelled by thousands of week-enders from the cities.

The season ended officially on September 30th. The park is rapidly taking on its winter aspect, as snow flurries are occurring frequently. The road was still open on October 15th and a few courageous campers were still coming in. The park officials are not encouraging such trips, as late comers hardly can expect to be comfortable and may encounter the hazards of early winter in the high country.

STATE PRESS COMMENT

Soviet is Not Wanted Here.

Is Oregon going to join the L. W. W. this year? Is this state going to join Wisconsin, Minnesota, and the Dakotas in attempting to force the soviet form of government on the United States by giving a majority to the radical element as represented by the La Follette-Whelan party?

It hardly seems possible that so patriotic a state as Oregon would cast its vote for the man who gave all the comfort and sympathy he could to Germany during the war; the man who wants to make the constitution of the United States a mere scrap of paper and one who is posing as a progressive while all his works and utterances are of the most radical nature.

Have the laboring men who are shouting so loud for the "red" candidates ever stopped to consider what the consequences will be? Where the business of the country will be with a soviet sympathizer in the White House?

No, we do not believe that Oregon will join the ranks of those states which are blindly following a leader whose program would produce the same conditions in the United States that exist in Russia.

The United States, a proud world leader, sunk to the level of a consort and companion of Russia.

No; the idea is unthinkable. At heart the citizenry of Oregon is American through and through, and it will repudiate the attempt to make this country a dog in the Russian bolshevik-Caucasian Scindian.

Republican Victory Assured

With the election only three weeks off, discussion of pet subjects as indication of the direction in which political sentiment is moving and is prophetic pointer to the outcome to be expected in the November election is in order.

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them as prophetic omens.
From the time when it first came into control, the administration has devoted its efforts to solution of the nation's problems, foreign and domestic. Achievements of varied Pacific questions and agreements on reduction of naval armament at the Washington conference, which carry back in credit to President Harding's initiative in calling that meeting, are impressive contributions to the progress of world peace and national welfare.

In dealing with domestic problems, the administration's efforts have met with equally conspicuous success. It found the nation laboring under depressed economic conditions and speedily set about relief. One of the first acts of the executive was the calling of congress in session for enactment of legislation necessary to the restoration of abnormal conditions to normal, with special reference to revision of taxation and tariff. Since that time the administration has never slackened in exertion of proper pressure to this end. It has consistently and persistently championed and urged legislation for rehabilitation of agricultural and other purposes of national import and promotion of the public good. And the long list of constructive and remedial congressional enactments bear testimony to the efficiency of such pressure. Retrenchments in governmental expenditure to be credited to the administration aggregate an enormous sum, which represents corresponding lightening of the burden on the taxpayers. Its inauguration of the budget system marked the beginning of an era of business-like handling of public affairs that is destined to work incalculable benefit to the nation at large. The proof of a pudding is in the eating, and proof of the efficacy of the administration's dealing with economic problems is in the improvement of conditions.

The American people have been given to see the administration in the exercise of governmental stewardship. They have seen it in action in their behalf against menacing conditions and have witnessed its effective dealing with difficult situations. They have seen it pursue the course that ensured maximum service in their cause, regardless of antagonism that might mean loss of votes in certain quarters. And having seen all this, the people can be counted on to continue the support that it extended on confidence in the last election. The administration has proved itself wholly worthy of its continuance. Its claim to support is for services rendered and to be rendered. And such a claim has always carried with the American people.—Grants Pass Courier.

PITTSBURGH BALL PLAYER SUMMONED

CHICAGO, Oct. 17.—Emil Yde, Pittsburgh National League pitcher, has been summoned by Kenesaw M. Landis, baseball commissioner, to appear before him with any information he may have concerning the Jimmy O'Connell "Cozy" Dolan affair.

The commissioner's action was the outcome of reported statements by Yde in which he was quoted as saying "something more sensational may be sprung shortly." At his home in Free Port, Illinois, Yde issued a statement in which he denied having made any statements regarding the terms of his contract with the Pittsburgh club or the condition of any player on the Pittsburgh club before a game with New York or any other team.

PITTSBURGH, Oct. 17.—"Emil Yde, is too conservative, too level-headed, to give out such a statement until he had positive proof, and if he had that he would have talked to me first. He never mentioned it to me," declared Barney Dreyfuss, owner of the Pittsburgh club, following the action of Commissioner Landis in questioning Yde to appear before him to explain statements attributed to him that "something more sensational may be sprung shortly in connection with bribery charges in major league circles."

Confidence that Yde had made no statement regarding bribery charges was also expected by W. B. McKechnie, manager of the team who declared that "if Yde had any information that Commissioner Landis ought to know, I am confident he would have talked with Mr. Dreyfuss first and myself."
