## POLISH NOVELIST MEMORY HONORED

WARSAW, Oct. 17.—A delegation left today for Vienna, Switzerland, to bring back the body of Henryk Sienkiewicz, Polish novelist, the author of "Quo Vadis," who died there in 1916. The delegation includes the novelist's only son, Henry, and is headed by one of his closest friends, Stanislaw Lesicki. The body is to be reinterred here in a magnificent tomb.

## RED ARMY VICTORS

HONG KONG, Oct. 17.—The merchant volunteer corps of Canton known as the Chinese fascists have been defeated by the army forces of the "Red Army" composed of Chinese laborers after warfare in the streets of Canton lasted two days, according to a wireless message received by Hong Kong from Canton by naval authorities. A confrontation which resulted from the hostilities, burned in Canton all day Wednesday, but was brought under control today after damage totaling an estimated loss of \$1,000,000 had been done and a large number of persons were killed or injured to death.

## ANTHEM ELIMINATED

COPENHAGEN, Oct. 17.—Elimination of the national anthem, which is customarily played whenever the flag is present, was ordered by Mrs. Hans, Swedish queen-mother of the crown, as a salute to the performance last evening in the Royal Theater.

Most of the spectators objected to their colleagues' order and the queen showed her resentment by refusing to sing all the verses of the anthem, concluding with loud cheering for the king.

## MANY SHEEP SHIPPED

SHEPHERD, Oct. 17.—More than 10,000 sheep have been shipped out of Princeton during the last two months, according to official statistics. Forty-one cars were shipped to Chicago during September and 25 cars have been shipped out during the first ten days of October.

During the last three months, the total of cattle has been shipped out of Princeton more than 100,000. The highest number of calves were shipped during September when 22 cars were shipped to Portland.

# BLACK NIGGER IN WOODPILE

Proposed Amendment to Workmen's Compensation Bad Legislation.

SO SAYS M. F. RICE

Local Attorney Alleges That If Adopted Farmers and Dairymen Will Be Hard Hit.

Oregon's farmers, dairymen and working people, as well as her industries, need the help of every voting citizen to defeat the so-called Workmen's Compensation Law, declared M. F. Rice, local attorney, who has given considerable study to the proposed constitutional amendment.

"This so-called amendment," said Attorney Rice, "was initiated by a small group of Portland's professional leaders, and is so worded that every farmer or dairyman who employs a single helper can be forced to pay into the state accident fund, and submit to all its red tape and be compelled to obey all its rules. No matter what happens the law specifically denies him the right of appeal to a jury or to any other authority.

"But that is only the beginning. The self same amendment hits just as hard at the workman himself. It makes the three-man commission the supreme dictator over labor. It gives the commission the right to raise compensation rates on the workman; it gives the commission absolute authority to make small compensation awards or none at all when a man is injured. It gives it the right to delay payment to injured men or their dependents, and likewise authority to force injured and sick men to go to the doctors the commission tells them to go to and no other. In short the amendment aims at state monopoly and is in direct line with the long hoped for inclusion of our farmers and dairymen as forced contributors to the state compensation fund.

"Nor is that all. The amendment if it is ratified and becomes operative law, would practically nullify the present time tested and proved good compensation law. It would undo the work of many years of constructive effort. The present law makes compensation for injured workmen certain, and fixes the rates of compensation specifically. Furthermore, it gives the workman the right of appeal to a jury in case he is either slighted or is not given justice. But under the proposed constitutional amendment that right of appeal and certainty of compensation would be stolen from him. In other words, the amendment boldly demands the surrender of the basic American right of appeal and of fair hearing, and sets up in its place a commission that would be superior to law, and in addition a law unto itself. Such power is dangerous. Not alone that, but the amendment would open the way for the return of the old system of ambulance chasing lawyers, damage suits, waste and suffering on the part of injured men, and more expenses for our farming people and more complications to boss us around.

"We have traveled too far to turn back. The only proper thing to do is to vote down this compulsory compensation amendment and keep right on improving the present good law whenever the conditions warrant it."

**FORD WITHDRAWAL AIDS**

WASHINGTON, Oct. 17.—Withdraw by Henry Ford of his offer for Muscie Shoals clears the way, Representative Kearns republican, Ohio, declared today, after a visit at the White House, for disposition of the plant through a commission as suggested by President Coolidge in his message to congress last December.

Mr. Kearns said he had assurance that the president's attitude in this respect was unchanged and that therefore he would seek appointment of a commission by congress as soon as it convenes in December.

**TRAVEL TO LAKE HEAVY.**

MEDFORD, Or., Oct. 17.—All records for travel to Crater Lake were broken this year, according to the official report of Superintendent C. G. Thomson just released. Up to the evening of September 30, 64, 312 visitors entered the park as against 52,917 for the preceding year, an increase of over 20 per cent.

Every state in the union was represented excepting Georgia and many foreign countries. Oregon leads all the states with California a close second, 22,373. The Madison Hotel, Roseburg, had the highest attendance, 22,888.
