SUBJECT FOR THE HOME, NOT THE SCHOOL.

"Sex education is a subject for the home not for the school. For much of the well-intended but nevertheless sentimental slop known as sex education I have a decided distaste. The only satisfactory form of sex education I have ever encountered for the boy is a fine, normal, natural relationship with his father or some older man whom he likes, respects and trusts. Social hygiene should come after puberty and not before."

Dr. Borden S. Veeder made this statement this week before the second day session of the second annual meeting of the American Child Health Association. Dr. Veeder is professor of clinical pediatrics at Washington University St. Louis, Missouri. His address on "Physical Aspects of the Problems of Late Childhood and Early Adolescence," was given before several hundred child health specialists from all parts of the country assembled for this meeting in Kansas City.

"The gist of sex education," said Dr. Veeder, "is a happy, normal relationship between parents and children which must have its beginnings long before puberty. The most important thing for parents to understand in regard to adolescence is that their child is undergoing far-reaching fundamental physical changes and that there is a physical basis back of all the peculiar and usually irritating changes in temperament, disposition and attitude toward the family and life which is so prone to develop at this time."

Dr. Veeder emphasized the care that should be given to the adolescent boy and girl.

"Growing boys need nearly half again as much food as a farmer working in the fields," Dr. Veeder stated. "In studies made at one of the eastern preparatory schools it was found that boys of 13 to 16 years actually took approximately five thousand calories of food daily and apparently required this amount. This amount is nearly half as much again as a farmer at his daily work requires."

"A definite program of athletic and physical play is as necessary and integral a part of the educational life of the adolescent as the school program," continued Dr. Veeder. "The development of recent years of forms of outdoor sports and recreation for girls is to be encouraged. But in arranging such a program the difference in the anatomical development of sexes must be kept in mind."

"The picture of the ungainly awkward adolescent child so familiar to all of us is the result of failure of control and coordination to keep pace with the rapid muscular growth combined with the tendency of the muscles to grow in length more rapidly than the bones. For this reason muscular exercise and training are essential."

Let us show the world how many voters we really have. Let us forget: Election day is November 4.

SLUSH FUND FOR "WEAK" STATES

Documentary Evidence Supports Claim of Senator La Follette.

MAY REACH \$12,000,000

Frank P. Walsh Told Committee That It Is Apparent Three Separate Funds Raised.

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)
CHICAGO, Oct. 18.—Documentary evidence designed to support the charges of Senator La Follette that a republican "slush fund" is being raised for use in doubtful states, was presented today to the special senate investigating committee by Frank P. Walsh, counsel for La Follette.

It consisted of letters from officials of the republican national organization, New York, bankers and manufacturers and business men of Philadelphia and other places.

Walsh told the committee that it seemed to be apparent that three separate funds were being raised, one by the republican national committee, one by the bankers and a third by the manufacturers and other business interests.

Also Walsh declared that "very hasty investigation" had led Senator La Follette to believe that his original estimate of the amount of the alleged "slush fund" had been too low; that the sum probably would total \$10,000,000 as a low estimate, and perhaps reach \$12,000,000.

Edward T. Stotesbury, of Philadelphia, was named by Walsh as chairman of the committee which is to raise funds for the bankers and the Kansas City attorney asked that he be summoned.

Walsh added that he had been informed that at a recent convention of bankers in Chicago, a speech had been made urging that trust companies contribute one-twelfth of one per cent of their capitalization to the fund to support Coolidge and Dawes, and that national banks contribute one-tenth of one per cent for the purpose.

After he had presented the various letters, some signed by Joseph R. Grundy of Bristol, Pennsylvania, chairman of the ways and means committee of the republican national committee, others by George W. Simmons, vice-president of the Mechanics and Metals National Bank, of New York, "for the bankers' committee," and others by the finance committee of the manufacturers club of Philadelphia, Walsh asked that these witnesses be summoned, Edward T. Stotesbury, Joseph R. Grundy, Charles W. Hill, of Philadelphia, a member of Grundy's republican committee; Samuel L. Vauclain, president of the Baldwin Locomotive Works, Philadelphia; W. W. Atterbury, vice-president of the Pennsylvania railroad; T. V. O'Connor, of Buffalo, a member of the United States shipping board; Charles D. Miller, republican national committee man from New York; George W. Simmons, New York; Nathan T. Howell, treasurer of the Manufacturers Club, Philadelphia; W. T. Gallieher, of Washington, chairman of the District of Columbia campaign fund committee; John T. King, of Philadelphia; W. V. Hodges, treasurer of the republican national committee; Carl W. Rudick, former congressman from Montana and now identified with the republican national organization; J. W. Perry, Kansas City banker; Theodore Gary, president of the Kansas City Telephone company; Joseph P. Shannon of Kansas City, former chairman of the Missouri state democratic committee, and whom Walsh said, had made some charges in connection with the alleged "slush fund"; John T. Kennedy, Kansas City business man, and the managers of the Hamilton Hotel, Washington, D. C., and of a Washington Taxicab company.

These witnesses will be called before a committee at Washington where the investigation, now in its third day will be resumed, probably next Thursday.

The Grundy letters collecting funds predominated in the batch handed to the committee by Walsh in one. La Follette and Wheeler were likened to Lenin and Trotsky, the possibility of the election of Charles W. Bryan as president by the senate was presented and urgent appeals made for funds quickly for use in states outside of Pennsylvania.

With either La Follette or the democrats in power, Grundy asserted in his letters, Andrew W. Mellon would be removed as secretary of the treasury, the Simmons-Underwood tariff would be rescinded and business generally would suffer.

Grundy reiterated in his letters that "gratitude and intelligent self-interest are the foundations of modern civilization," and urged this as an added reason why contributions should be forthcoming for the support of the Coolidge-Dawes ticket.
