PORTLAND'S RAT HORDE COSTLY

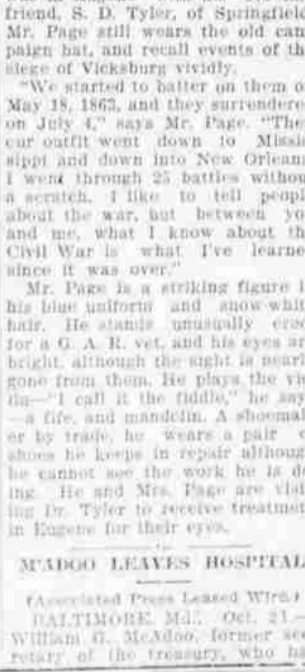
