

PUBLICATION OF TAX RETURNS IS FAVORED BY BOB

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)

KINGSTON, N. Y., Oct. 25.—Senator Cousens, chairman of a committee authorized to investigate the internal revenue bureau was urged today by Senator La Follette, independent presidential candidate to call Secretary Mellon and Commissioner Blair of the bureau before the committee and to ask them "by what authority they seek to subvert the will of congress."

In sending a telegram to Mr. Cousens suggesting such action, Mr. La Follette, who was on his way south from Syracuse, took cognizance of published reports that the two officials have objected to the publication by newspapers of the names of taxpayers and the amount of their income taxes.

Declaring he understood Mr. Blair had issued a warning "threatening" newspapers with "fine and imprisonment" if they published such information, Senator La Follette said he believed the commissioners "threat" violates the spirit of the publicity amendment of the revenue act and subverts the intent of congress that the public should know who is paying taxes and how much they pay."

"The purpose of this amendment" continued La Follette's telegram to Mr. Cousens, was, "to provide a means of checking up on tax dodgers by exposing the facts to public scrutiny this purpose would be defeated if publication is prevented."

"Secretary Mellon is quoted as saying that congress did not intend to permit newspaper publication to satisfy idle curiosity. Secretary Mellon may regard it as idle curiosity for the public to know who is paying taxes, who is dodging them, but congress did not so regard it when it passed this amendment at the end of a fight extending over more than 10 years."

"This is another example of the arrogance of Secretary Mellon in setting himself up as a judge over congress, similar to his action in attempting to block investigation by the senate of his own department."

As he traveled southward today from Syracuse, N. Y., where he spoke last night, Senator La Follette had in prospect a week-end rest in Aiken, Maryland, a village on the Susquehanna River before plunging in his final week of campaigning.

He has no speaking engagement on his schedule for tonight and he plans to remain in seclusion at Aiken until he continues

DE VALERA SENT ACROSS BORDER

HELFAST, Oct. 25.—Eamon De Valera, the republican leader, who was taken into custody at Newry yesterday, when he attempted to address a meeting, was sent across the Ulster border this morning, having given a bond to leave quietly.

There was no demonstration when De Valera departed. He was warned he would incur two years' imprisonment if he returned.

Authorities took the precaution of stationing armed police outside the bedroom in the head constable's quarters in Newry barracks, where De Valera slept. He refused to eat breakfast.

Mr. De Valera arrived in Dublin this morning and visited republican headquarters where he made arrangements for visits to Sligo tomorrow, Derry, Monday and Tyrone and Armagh Tuesday. He declared he intended to keep these engagements notwithstanding the threats of arrest by the Ulster government.

MAIL ORDER PRES. RESINS HIS JOB

CHICAGO, Oct. 25.—Julius Rosenwald, for fifteen years president of Sears Roebuck and company, has announced his retirement to become chairman of the board of directors of the mail order house, Charles M. Kittle, senior vice-president of the Illinois Central Railroad, has been named his successor.

General R. E. Wood, former vice president of Montgomery Ward and company will become a vice-president of Sears, Roebuck and company.

Mr. Rosenwald entered the company when it was owned and operated by the late Richard Sears. During the post war deflation period, when the company suffered heavy losses on its inventory and merchandising contracts, he purchased its plant for \$16,000,000 and deflated it to \$5,000,000 par value of its common stock.
