He was taken before Recorder Whipple where he entered a plea of guilty and paid the fine of \$50 assessed against him. He then went back to Cottage Grove to settle the difficulties there.

CARRY OUT SENTENCE

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 27.—

The sentence imposed on J. Al Pattison, head of the Pattison

Lumber company of Marion, Ore., after he had pleaded guilty to a charge that he conspired to "willfully misapply moneys of a federal reserve bank," must be carried out despite the acquittal of the chief conspirator, Jerome Mann, a director and cashier of the bank. It was ruled here today by the United States circuit court. The bank was the First National of Linton, Oregon. According to the indictment Pattison "knowingly and unlawfully aided and abetted Mann."

Pattison pleaded guilty in the United States district court in Portland and was sentenced to pay a fine of \$500 within 60 days from date of sentence or go to jail until the fine was paid. Mann, however, pleaded not guilty and was acquitted.

Three years later the United States district attorney reported to the court that Pattison had not paid the fine.
