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7 MEASURES ON COMING BALLOT

Voters to Decide Upon Proposals at Election on November 4.

THREE INITIATED

Three Submitted by Legislature, One Petitioned for Referendum and Three Proposed by People.

Seven measures will appear on the state ballot in the November 4 election. These have been submitted to the people by the legislature, another is a referendum ordered by petition of the people and three are proposed by initiative petition, of the seven measures, public interest centers most around three; proposed repeal of the state income tax, substitution of a workman's compulsory compensation law in lieu of the present compensation law, and the oleomargarine and condensed milk bill.

The various measures, with their ballot title and a brief explanation of their purpose, follows:

VOTERS' TEST PROVIDED

Submitted by the legislature—

Voters' Literacy Amendment—

Purpose: To amend section 2 of article 2 of the constitution by adding to the qualifications of voters the requirement that they shall be able to read and write the English language and authorizing the means of testing the ability of such citizens to read and write the English language to be provided by law; also ratifying any act passed pursuant to and in accordance with this amendment.

Vote yes or no.

The foregoing measure is an attempt to restrict the voting franchise to those who are able to read and write. It is held by those favoring the measure, that persons unable to read and write the English language, are unable to vote intelligently. The nature of the test to be put is left to the legislature to determine.

Land Draining Bill—

Submitted by the legislature—

Public Use and Welfare Amendment—

Purpose: To amend section 18 of article 1 of the constitution to provide that the use of all the roads, ways and waterways, necessary to permit the transportation of the raw products of mine, or farm, or forest, or water for beneficial use or drainage, is necessary to the development and welfare of the state and is declared a public use. Vote yes or no.

The only change this measure causes is the inclusion of the "waterways" and "or water for beneficial use or drainage." The legislative committee which advocated the amendment stated it was designed to enable the legislature to provide laws in accordance with the constitution which shall encourage the draining of wet lands.

Bonus Amendment—

Submitted by the legislature—

Bonus Amendment—Purpose: To amend article XI-c of the constitution which provides a cash bonus or loan for world war soldiers, sailors and marines to include as eligible thereto female employees of the war department who served in the United States army signal or marine corps, or the army or any ally of the United States, and in the American expeditionary forces; also veterans of the Spanish-American war who served 90 days therein, and extending loan privileges to unmarried widow or dependent father or mother of any person who died in the service and who would have been entitled to a loan. Vote yes or no.

This is a self-explanatory, if the amendment is adopted by the people, the bonus or loan may be extended to world war veterans who will be available to Spanish-American war veterans, regular army men and women who served in the war from this state. Those latter are excluded by the provisions of the present bonus law.

Butter Substitutes.

Referred by Associated Industries of Oregon, 702 Oregon Building, Portland, Ore.: George G. Gold, president; C. M. Egbert, first vice-president; W. F. Prier, second vice-president; E. C. Page, secretary; all of Portland, Ore.

Oleomargarine and Condensed Milk Bill—Purpose: To make unlawful the manufacture, sale, exchange, etc., of the following: 1. Any substitute for butter containing milk or milk products and also containing any vegetable fat. 2. Any condensed or evaporated milk, containing any vegetable fat. 3. Any substitute for butter containing milk or products, unless the milk therein is pure, clean, fresh, unadulterated milk from which no cream or butterfat has been removed. 4. Condensed or evaporated milk, or any substitute therefor which contains, or in making which is used, milk which is not pure, clean, fresh, healthful and unadulterated. Vote yes or no.

This bill is sponsored by the dairying industry, which are endeavoring to prevent the sale of any butter substitutes containing

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milk, milk products, or vegetable fats. Its purpose, it is claimed, is to provide clean, wholesome and unadulterated dairy products. The passage of the bill, it is claimed, would also aid the dairying industry in Oregon, and would be of much benefit to the industry. Opponents of the measure claim that the passage of the measure would drive the margarine business from the state, will injure the manufacture of this food product in Oregon, and will increase the cost of living.

Naturopath Bill.

Initiated by Oregon State Association of Naturopaths: Dr. J. W. Sargent, president, 940 East Yamhill street, Portland, Ore.; Dr. Donald W. McRae, secretary, Island station, Milwaukie, Ore.

Naturopath Bill—Purpose: To authorize and regulate the practice of naturopathy in the state of Oregon, create a state board of naturopathic examiners and provide for their appointment and compensation, and define their powers and duties; to define naturopathy, and provide for the licensing and examination of naturopaths in the state of Oregon, and fix the fees therefor; to provide for prosecution and penalties for violations of said act, and for appeals from decisions of the state board of naturopathic examiners. Vote yes or no.

The purpose of the amendment is set forth above. Opposition to it comes from physicians of other schools, who say that if naturopathic physicians are to be regularly licensed in Oregon they ought to be subjected to the same standards of education and training as other physicians and all licensed physicians should then be governed by one regulating body.

Repeal Income Tax

Initiated by C. C. Chapman, editor Oregon Voter, 223 Worcester building, Portland, Ore.: Income Tax Repeal—Purpose: To repeal chapter 279 of the general laws of Oregon of 1923, known as the income tax act. Vote yes or no.

This is a proposition to repeal the income tax law of the state, which was adopted by a close vote a year ago. It is claimed that this law is turning millions of dollars in the form of new industries away from the state, and is retarding the growth and development of Oregon.

Initiated by Oregon Workmen's Compensation League: O. R. Hartwig, president or chairman, 4412 Forty-seventh street Southeast, Portland, Ore.; C. U. Taylor, vice-president or vice-chairman, 978 Rex avenue, Portland, Ore.; E. J. Stack, secretary-treasurer, Route No. 6, Portland, Ore.; Workmen's Compulsory Compensation Law for Hazardous Occupations—Purpose: To secure all citizens the benefits of the workmen's compensation law, making all employers and employees, public and private, in hazardous occupations, subject to said law, except those within jurisdiction of United States laws, providing for graduated scale of contributions to accident fund according to hazard, and for defining hazardous occupations; providing for limiting and regulating workmen's contributions for medical and hospital services providing for injury and death or death is caused by failure to provide safety appliances; and for payment for such failure; requiring referendum of all acts changing or repealing workmen's compensation law or regulations. Vote yes or no.

This amendment is intended to make workmen's compensation compulsory. Instead of optional, as at present. The amendment is offered by members of organized labor and is opposed by friends of the present compensation law who contend that the present law is working satisfactorily.

ENVOY TO EXPLAIN LAXITY OF PERSIA

WASHINGTON, Oct. 28.—An effort to explain to the satisfaction of the United States its position with respect to the punishment of the chief instigators of the murder of Vice-Consul Robert W. Ingham of Teheran will be made by the Persian government through an "extraordinary envoy."

Announcing the decision to commission the "extraordinary envoy" in an attempt to relieve any tension resulting from the apparent failure of Persian authorities to execute the death sentence in the case, Dagher M. Kazimi, charge d'affaires here, emphasized that friendship with the United States was one "of the essential policies" of his government.

In a statement issued after he had notified Acting Secretary of State Joseph C. Grew of the course planned, Charge Kazimi asserted that his government had not spared a moment of their time, effort and power from seeing to it that the guilty persons are brought to justice and punished accordingly, and "to bring about the satisfaction of the state department as well as that of the widow."

Comment on the matter was withheld by the state department but in informed quarters, it was doubtful if the special envoy would be able to satisfy the American government, with respect to what, in the opinion of some observers appears to be procrastination in executing the two men found guilty of the crime by Persian military and other courts. Insistence upon a firm application of the Persian laws in the case is expected to be the American course in view of the opinion here that safety of other diplomatic representatives in near eastern countries depends largely on the outcome.

DECLARE COOLIDGE OPPOSES VETERANS

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)

WASHINGTON, Oct. 28.—La Follette-Wheeler headquarters today made public a telegram to President Coolidge from John J. Hamilton and Harvey E. Garman, two of the California campaign officials, charging that republican managers in that state were attempting to disfranchise soldiers in veterans homes.

Asking the president to check the alleged tactics of his supporters, the telegram stated that veterans had been shifted from precinct to precinct in such a way that they would be prevented from voting in places where they had registered after fulfilling residence requirements.

"Speakers for La Follette have had difficulty getting a chance to address soldiers," it was added, "but Coolidge campaigners have had free access to them at all times."
