schools a student could either enter the junior year of either the state university or state college. The senior high school in such cases would be under the supervision of the university and would conform to university standards. There are a great many obvious advantages to such a course as explained by Dr. Seely.

In the first place it would give a college or university education to a great many more young people. By withdrawing the distinction between the grade and high schools, it would get more of them to finish this branch, while linking up the high school with the college would keep young people in school two years more and would lead them directly into the institutions of higher learning, for with only two more years to go few students would quit without a university or college diploma.

It would also be a great economical saving. Unless parents are fairly well off financially, it is a hard struggle to keep a boy or girl in college, while this system would allow them to remain at home while taking the first two years of their course.

It would also allow parents to keep their children at home two years longer. The average parents look with regret upon the time when their children must leave home, and keeping them with them two more years is a strong item in favor of the plan in the minds of many.

The cost of such a system would be more than made up in the money which would remain at home. At the present time local people are sending out thousands of dollars annually to Eugene, Corvallis, Salem, or other places where their children are attending school. This money would remain in Roseburg should the 6-4 plan be adopted.

Another advantage which the adoption of the plan would have, would be the establishing of an agricultural course in which the government would cooperate. These courses would all be standard, and would be recognized in any standard university or college.

Mr. Seely's proposal met with hearty response from all present.

evening. Most of the damage was caused from the wind and falling branches. It was said.

The stage of the Willamette river this morning showed a rise since yesterday morning at 3.6 feet, a rise of better than an inch an hour. The level jumped from 1.4 feet below the normal to 1.2 feet above the normal.

Several log rafts which have been stranded since April on account of the low water were afloat this morning.

MEDFORD, Or., Oct. 29.—With an inch and one quarter of rain since Monday night, the Rogue River valley was greeted with clear skies this morning and snow covered hills. The weather bureau reported this the heaviest 26-hour rain in over two years.

PENDLETON, Or., Oct. 29.—Pendleton was visited by a severe hail and electrical storm late yesterday afternoon. The storm came as the culmination of three more or less rainy days in which over a half inch of badly needed moisture fell. The precipitation is held invaluable by the farmers of the county who have sown their fall wheat.

BEND, Or., Oct. 29.—Snow was falling here this morning but with the temperature well above the freezing point it melted as soon as it touched the ground. The minimum temperature last night was 22 above zero.

A total of one and twelve hundredths inches of rain has fallen here since Sunday night, the greatest amount, ninety five hundredths inches, falling during the twenty four hours ending yesterday at 8 o'clock.

KLAMATH FALLS, Or., Oct. 29.—Klamath Falls crawled out from between blankets this morning to greet another blanket of snow—which fell during the night throughout the city. There is every indication that the storm has passed as the sky today is almost cloudless and the thin coating of snow is fast disappearing. The lowest temperature recorded during the night was 36 above.

ENGLENE, Or., Oct. 29.—Almost an inch of rain has fallen here during the past 24 hours, the total precipitation for the 24-hour period ending at 7:30 o'clock this morning being .85 inches. The heavy rainfall is continuing, according to an occasional puff of rain.

The Willamette river is two feet here during the past 24 hours.

BANK OF AURORA
IS ROBBED TODAY

PORTLAND, Or., Oct. 29.—The State Bank at Aurora, Oregon, was held up at about 1 p. m. by four men who obtained \$500 and fled in an auto toward Portland, according to reports to the police here.

The robbers fled toward Portland in a large touring car, bearing Oregon license 189-697.

Police records show that this license was issued to W. H. Hayden, R. F. D. Box 598, Milwaukie, for use on a small car.

Authorities believe that the robbers either stole the Hayden machine or the license plates and put them on the big car which they say was probably stolen also.

Portland authorities were asked to watch for the bandits and deputy sheriffs began a patrol of the east and west side highways leading into Portland.

Aurora is on the east side highway to Salem, about ten miles south of Oregon City.

Half a dozen city detectives were dispatched to cover the city arteries from the main Salem roads.

The robbers are described: No. 1, heavy overcoat of a light color, light cap, gray eyes, sharp nose.

No. 2, dark suit and soft cap.

No. 3, tan colored rain coat.

No. 4, no description.

He was the driver of the car and did not enter the bank with the other three.

All of the three who went into the building were said to be young men.

VICTIM OF DEATH

HILLSBORO, Or., Oct. 29.—Either the victim of suicide or of an accident, the lifeless body of Mrs. A. E. Newby, 42, was found in Rock Creek today just before noon. The woman had drowned some time during the night. The body was found by Ralph Anderson, a neighbor, who with the woman's husband, had conducted a search.

Mrs. Newby left her home last night, telling her husband she was to visit neighbors, and her husband was of the belief that she had remained with friends during the night, but when she did not return this morning he and Anderson started the search. Mrs. Newby was the mother of two sons, Paul and Albert Newby, aged 11 and 13 years, respectively.

The Newbys have resided on a farm four miles east of Hillsboro since 1917, with the exception of a brief period when they resided in California.
