LUTHERANS WILL CARRY ON WORK

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)

CHICAGO, Oct. 30.—Lutheran laymen and clergymen were returning to their homes today after completing the work of the fourth biennial convention of the United Lutheran Church in America here.

The closing session approved co-operation with other Lutheran bodies in European and other foreign work made appropriations for educational work in Canada and among young people.

A dissenting statement objecting to what its signers termed as "emphasis on the right of war" was included in the minutes in connection with a convention resolution urging the Lutheran world convention to take up the promotion of peace and declaring Christians should work for "the arbitration of reason," through "the establishment of some agency."

The resolution also reaffirmed "the right of Christians to engage in just war."
