

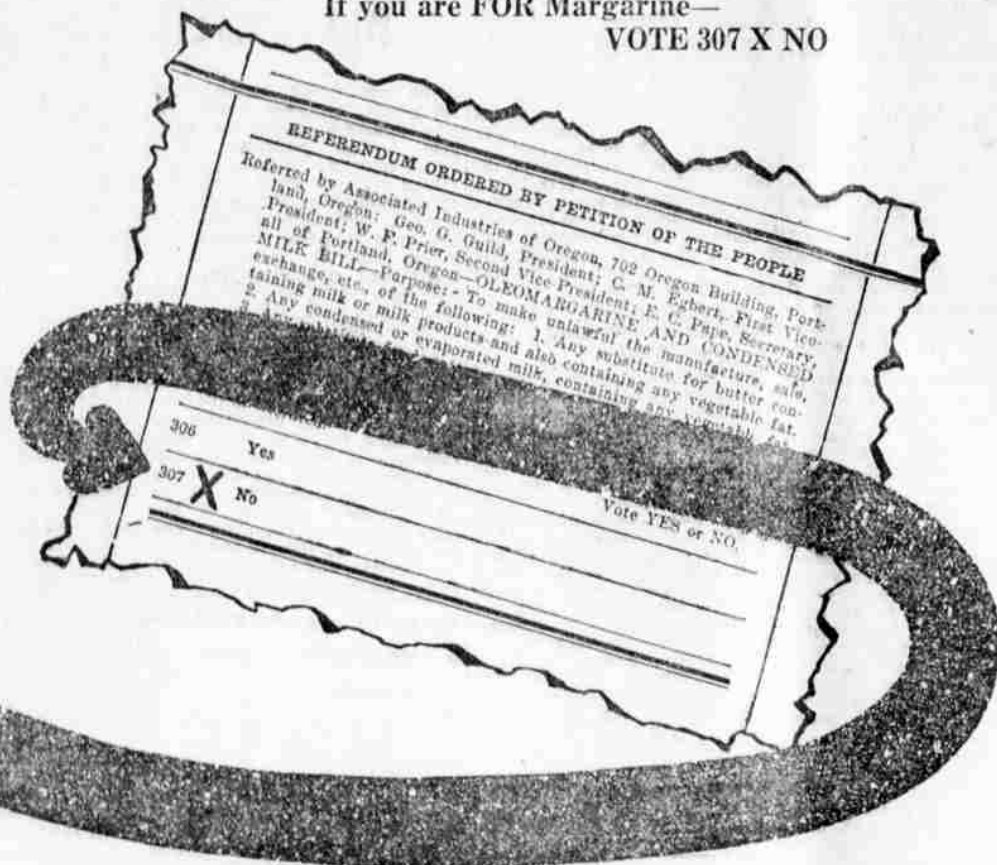

ASHLAND VICTOR

BY SCORE OF 14-7

Roseburg High School Unable to Fathom Visitors Aerial Attack and play an Offensive Game.

The mud-splattered team of the Roseburg high school yesterday suffered defeat at the hands of the Ashland eleven, 14 to 7. The Ashland boys upset the dope for a sloppy wet day and in spite of the condition of the field put forth an aerial attack on the Roseburgers with the result that many forward passes were completed and long yardage gained. Several fumbles occurred during the contest but the breaks of the game were about even, both sides having a touch of hard luck. Punting was practically impossible and the line bucks were resorted to by Roseburg for their gains. At several times, Rusty Irwin and Ray Jost broke through the line for long runs, but they could not overcome the ability of the visitors in passing. Albert Marske was the outstanding Ashland star. This youngster practically won yesterday's game single-handed. He is light and wiry and wriggled through the Roseburg line like an eel.

Ashland made the first touchdown on a beautiful completed pass over the line. They failed to convert the goal in an attempted place-kick. This whipped up the locals and they tore into the game with the real old Roseburg "fight." Down the field they pressed until within one foot of the goal line. With a mighty linebacker they succeeded in shoving the pigskin over the line by a scant inch. With a fine dropkick the goal was converted, the score standing 7 to 6, favoring Roseburg at the end of the first half.

In the second half, however, Ashland again tried their aerial attack and made wonderful yardage, annexing another touchdown and failing again to convert the goal. The score for Ashland was 12. On a safety they gained two more points and the scoring stopped.

Both teams played a fine game considering the condition of the gridiron. It appeared that Ashland had the fastest squad, however, and had the field been a dry one, it is only fair to say, that they would have probably tallied a higher score.

The Roseburg boys used the huddle system which speeded the game up considerably.

A steady downpour of rain was recorded during the entire contest, but in spite of the wetness a fine crowd attended.

1,550,000 PEOPLE VISITED NATIONAL PARK DURING 1924

WASHINGTON, Nov. 1.—(United Press.)—The lure of America's national parks and monuments attracted more than 1,550,000 people during the 1924 season, according to the latest department. By virtue of the fact that the attendance at the parks this year was 160,000 in excess of last year, the department believes that national reservations are steadily growing in popularity.

This new high in visitors was attracted even though there was a decided dropping off in two California parks, due to outbreaks of the hant and mouth disease, and reports of numerous forest fires which deterred many people from going to various other parks.

Rocky Mountain National Park, Colorado, with a visiting list of 224,211 people, headed the list as it did last year. Hot Springs, Ark., was next with 161,483. Four other parks—Yellowstone, Yosemite, Grand Canyon, and Platt, Okla.—each were visited by more than a hundred thousand visitors, and six of the parks showed a travel increase of 25 per cent or more.
