BERKELEY, Calif., Nov. 1.—Husky led upholding the football honor of the University of California, marching toward their fifth straight championship in the Pacific Coast conference, found themselves confronted today by their first big obstacle. It was a human wall of Trojans from the University of Southern California, who came up from Los Angeles with their armor solid, their weapons sharpened and their banners waving a forecast of victory.

For many years now it has been the ambition of Coach Elmer C. Henderson of the southern institution to wipe up the gridiron with California. The sunny persons making up his team, the campus, the city and the surrounding country shared that aspiration. When this season opened, after watching the Trojan players run up 159 points to their opponents 16, however, every one south of the Tehachas, including Mr. Henderson, said this was the year.

California, meanwhile, was scoring but \$7 to its enemy's 24 and playing most of the time without the surface revealed by the Trojans. Coach Andy Smith said little and worked much. Gradually his team improved until it showed unsuspected power when it defeated Washington state Saturday, yet many experts conceded U. S. C. at least an edge.

The two universities were meeting undefeated and a victory for either would virtually eliminate the other from the conference race, leaving Stanford and Washington in the lead.

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REPORT MADE ON TROUT HATCHERY

T. H. Hill, superintendent of the Rock Creek trout hatchery, was in Roseburg today suffering from an infection in the right arm. He received a cut just above the wrist, and working in the water taking out fish and doing other work about the hatchery the small wound became infected and quite painful. He will be required to remain in Roseburg for several days.

The high water, Mr. Hill reports, is bringing up hundreds of fish, and he has taken out more than 100 trout in 24 hours. So far the water has done no particular damage, but if the rains continue it is feared that there may be some losses.

The hatchery this year handled 1,955,930 eggs. There were planted 1,444,138 fish in various streams. Fifty thousand were planted in Cow creek, 50,000 in Elk creek, 100,000 in North and South Myrtle, 80,000 in Little River, 100,000 in Calapooia, and the remainder in Rock creek and the North Umpqua.
