IT WAS A GREAT ELECTION.

Yesterday was a great election throughout the United States and by a majority of definite landslide proportions President Coolidge's administration has been unmistakably approved by the country and will now settle down to a conservative business basis for another 4 years. Radicalism has been discredited to the utmost degree, demonstrating most conclusively that the people, as a whole, are awake to the interests of their country and do not intend to tolerate unwise principles that would lower the standard of American citizenship. In fact, Senator La Follette's vote throughout the nation is a bitter denunciation of his platform; at this writing only one state in the union has swung to his column and pre-election predictions that the presidency would be thrown into congress were not fulfilled. The strength of Mr. Davis, the democratic candidate for president, also is evidence that there is still two great political parties—the republican and democratic—and no third party has so far been born to seriously threaten their existence.

What kind of a personage heads the nation can best be judged by the simple expressions of President Calvin Coolidge, made this morning, after receiving a vote of thanks from the American voter at yesterday's election, and couched in the following language:

"It does not seem possible to me to make an adequate expression concerning the presidency of the United States. No other honor equals it, no other responsibility approaches it. When it is conferred by an overwhelming choice of the American people and vote of the electoral college these are made all the greater and I can only express my simple thanks to all those who have contributed to this result and plainly acknowledge that it was brought to pass through the work of a divine providence, of which I am but one instrument. Such power as I have I dedicate to the service of all my country and all of my countrymen. In the performance of the duties of my office I cannot ask for anything more than the sympathetic consideration which my fellow-Americans have always bestowed upon me. I have no appeal except to the common sense of all the people. I have no pledge except to serve them. I have no object except to promote their welfare."

That's Calvin Coolidge. Plain, simple, quiet in demeanor. Nothing radical, nothing bombastic or fanatical in his ideals. Just a man who wants to serve his people and serve them well.

The country will now prosper, confidence has been restored and the nation has at its head a man who will apply a business administration that is sure to bring telling results to the country at large.

John W. Davis, the democratic candidate, is a real fellow, and he is also a mighty big man. Note his attitude in reference to his defeat in yesterday's election, published in today's dispatches. Mr. Davis is every inch a man and the country would not have "gone to the dogs" had he been successful in gaining the presidency.

The muck-rakers who have been traveling over Oregon at the state's expense gathering "evidence" against Tom Kay in an attempt to defeat him in yesterday's election will now get their pay envelopes. Pierce's army of mud-slingers did no good for Jefferson Myers.

Roseburg has a new mayor and several new councilmen. Now, let's forge ahead and accomplish definite results. Keep pace with the administration of the past two years—lead out and put the old city over the hump stronger than ever.

No noticeable land-slides were in evidence in Douglas county at yesterday's election. On the contrary there were quite a few neck-and-neck races until every precinct had been tallied. Some pretty events were staged.

Tom Kay made Jefferson Myers—Walter Pierce's candidate for state treasurer—look like thirty cents in yesterday's election. Walter is too big a loss for any candidate to carry.

Well, La Follette can now take Wisconsin and put the old girl in his carpet bag and bid a fond adieu to the political arena—from which he emerged without credit or honor.

UNCLE SAM MAKES MONEY ON SEALSKINS

WASHINGTON, Nov. 5.—(The Associated Press.)—The department of commerce has found that by simply using a different color dye in marking seal-skins, the government-owned Prudhoe Island fur seals can be doubled.

At the annual sale at St. Louis in October, when \$125,000 worth of seals were sold, 1,846 which had been dyed a rich chestnut brown brought \$41.75 per seal, compared with \$20.75 for those which were dyed the customary black.

The new dye is an American invention and the finding of the seals was an experiment which has proved successful, according to Secretary Dill.

The finding was announced yesterday by the department of commerce and the finding was made at their direction.

Democrats Victors

All six of the seats in the house held by democrats from Pennsylvania have been captured by republicans. This constituted the biggest individual state upset in the congressional elections in early 1924.

One of the six seats the democrats held from New Jersey also was won by republicans in the re-election.

Only Two Democrats

Only two New England states—Maine and Vermont—will have democratic representation in the next house as compared with four at present.

The democrats lost one seat each in Connecticut and New Hampshire, but retained their seats in Rhode Island and their three in Massachusetts.

The republicans gained one seat in New York and one in New Jersey, but lost their seats in New York and New Jersey.

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DAVIS PROVES A GAME LOSER

Takes Defeat in Optimistic Manner and Says Coolidge Has His Good Wishes.

DEMOCRATS FAITHFUL

Still Believes Principles of Party Will Inevitably Triumph—Wires to Running Mate.

NEW YORK, Nov. 5.—A statement was issued by Mr. Davis at the residence of Frank L. Folk, former under-secretary of state at whose home Mr. Davis received the election returns. When he had written the statement and addressed a telegram of congratulation to President Coolidge Mr. Davis left for his home in Locust Valley.

The text of the statement follows:

"The results of the election speak for themselves and the democratic party needs no comment or explanation unnecessary. I accept the outcome without any vain regrets or bitterness, and it is my earnest hope that the administration of President Coolidge may prove successful and beneficial to the country."

"So far as I am personally concerned, I am unshaken in my faith in the principles and ideals professed by the democratic party. They will never lack defenders. To those who supported so loyally throughout the campaign I am more grateful than I can say, and I am glad to march on with them as a comrade in the ranks toward the inevitable triumph of the principles in which we believe."

"Greater than any transient success is the welfare of our common country and to this it is the duty and privilege of every citizen to contribute whether in office or out of it."

Mr. Davis sent the following telegram to his running mate Governor Bryan of Nebraska:

"In this hour of defeat let me thank you again for your assistance and support. We have made a clean and open fight and can accept the result without bitterness."
