RETURNS FROM COUNTY ARE IN

450 votes, and the same conditions prevailed, the two being very close until the slower precincts made their report. Thudso is history repeat itself.

The closest contest of the entire election was between Meryl Shaver and Walter Fisher. Hercher, republican, received 3478 votes. Shaver, republican 3004; Fisher, democrat, 3087 and Goodman, democrat, 2562. This gives Fisher the second place by the small margin of 83 over Shaver, and Douglas county will be represented in the lower house of the state legislature by one republican and one democrat.

Beckley was given a lead of 630 over Daugherty for county commissioner. The county court has adopted an order appointing Beckley to fill the unexpired term of Commissioner Long, deceased, and the newly elected commissioner will take his seat at once, not waiting until the first of the year, the time when he would be regularly installed.

Sam Starnes, unopposed for sheriff, received the greatest number of votes given, any candidate upon the ticket, receiving 6,174.

Riddle defeated Morgan, almost two to one, winning in nearly every county precinct.

The down-river precincts, reporting late, increased Sawyer's lead over Agee, so that he moved out his democratic opponent by 339 votes.

Calkins remains county assessor by a vote of 4191 to 2844 over Osborn.

Mrs. Aekert won from Maybelle Church in a close contest, her margin being less than 500 votes.

This is the first time that Douglas county has ever been reported complete before the tally sheets were opened by the counting board. This election the News-Review made careful plans for collecting the returns, and with the fine cooperation received from its friends all over the county a report is possible on every precinct in the county, and the final totals are given. The magnitude of this task is not realized except by those in close contact with the task.

Obtaining results of an election in a county larger than many eastern states, and in fact larger than three of them combined, is a task in itself, especially when it is taken into consideration that there is no telephone communication in many sections, that the population of the entire county is less than 25,000 and that many of the roads are almost impassable, and that only occasional mail service is maintained with some communities. It is easily seen that the job of obtaining results from these many points is a difficult one, especially when so many election boards pay no attention whatever to instructions about returning statements outside the ballot boxes, and send in every report sealed up and post nothing outside the polling place for reference.

In view of these conditions the News-Review feels gratified with the way returns have been received and wishes to thank a lot of those who gave such complete cooperation. The results in the 6 precincts on the initiative and referendum measures follow:

For years the horsemen have wintered in Salem and they are objecting strongly to any action of the board to shut them out. The board members claim that some of the horsemen have not been careful about co-operating in keeping up the grounds, and that some cases of disorderly conduct have been reported in which employees of the horsemen were concerned.
