JOB UNSOUGHT BY C. G. DAWES

Vice-President-Elect Not Interested in Politics Before.

THIRD OFFICE HELD

Eleventh Hour Selection by Republican Convention—Duties Ahead Too Tame for Him.

(Associated Press Telegram Wire.)
CHICAGO, Nov. 6.—Charles G. Dawes on next March 4, will assume an office which he originally did not seek and which he offered him six months ago he almost certainly would have declined.

This statement was made today by some of those closest to the vice-presidential elect and by those who know the inside story of how the lumber, soldier, business man, philanthropist and economist has come to the place where after March 4, he will be second only to the president.

Six months ago Mr. Dawes returned from Europe after serving as head of the export committee of the reconstruction committee which had worked out a plan for the economic reconstruction of Europe. It was his third period of public service after having been comptroller of the currency under President McKinley and director of the budget under President Harding. Mr. Dawes accordingly set about to arrange his affairs so as to spend the rest of his life as a private citizen, devoting his time to his family and business interests and to the life of a wealthy man who loves music, art and books, and whose name is connected with a number of charitable and non-charitable enterprises.

Then the republican national committee came along and got itself into a snarl over the selection of a running mate for President Coolidge. Mr. Dawes was down at Marietta, Ohio, attending a reunion of his college class and little interested in the events at Cleveland. Conferees among party leaders with the convention having produced no unanimity of opinion as to the vice-presidential nominee, the convention took things into its own hands and nominated former Governor Lowden of Illinois. Mr. Dawes promptly declined the honor and the name of Dawes already mentioned with the support of New Jersey and Nebraska was brought forward.

Mr. Dawes was told of the move that was taking form and opposition and indicated he would accept. The nomination, therefore, over the opposition of some of its leaders turned to Dawes. Then close to him in Chicago decided it was his opposition that caused him to consent to previous use of his name and added that the prospect of a high-made him want the nomination. U. S. PROVIDES CASH FOR GERMAN CREDITS

(United Press Correspondent.)
WASHINGTON, Nov. 6.—(United Press.)—The United States, through providing a 50 percent of the \$200,000,000 loan to Germany, will benefit the loan, a day government official said today.

This country, the official said, must content itself with the loan and trade profits while the reparations receiving nations will be the real beneficiaries.

"The \$119,000,000 which America eagerly provided for Germany," the observer said, "went not, of course, to the country's treasury, but to the banks."

The link of the monetary system and the closely allied bank system, he said, is the key to the solution of the world's financial problems.

The official said that about 100,000,000 dollars have been loaned to the United States by the German government, and that the United States has agreed to provide a 50 percent of the loan.

The bankers, who financed the loan in this country, have already passed on their profit: the official said. He estimated the cost of the loan to the bankers at 87 percent of par, while it sold to the public, who thereby assumed the risk, at 92.

All transactions having to do with the granting of credit against the loan will be passed upon by the Agent General for Reparations, S. Parker Gilbert, in America and former Under Secretary of the Treasury.

Success or failure of Germany "to get back on her feet" the official said, depends largely on the administration of the loan credit. It must be handled in such a manner as to keep the German mark in for foreign exchange.

Meanwhile, in the year meantime from reparations payment balance its budget and apportioned taxes on a sound basis.

Official Optimistic
The official was optimistic over Germany's ability to "come through" within the past few months he said the government has assumed a surplus which was sufficient to retire certain short term obligations.

Success for Germany reconstruction is based on a new theory about through the demand for reparations in the use of gold.

The establishment of German credits through the recent loan, the official said, "amounts to putting the currency of Germany on a gold exchange basis, instead of the customary gold reserve. The German bank of issue now has the option of giving a draft on a foreign bank, where credit has been set up, or paying in gold, which of course, she cannot do."

Under this method you don't keep the gold locked up in vaults where it doesn't work; but instead it can be invested in interest bearing securities, such as treasury notes, etc.

Question Of Taxes
"The big question," the observer said, "is whether the German taxes in marks can be converted into gold exchange values, represented in dollars and pounds sterling, without seriously disturbing the foreign exchange market for marks."

To accomplish this, Germany must export more of her goods and services than she imports—the excess to go toward the payment of reparations. The importation of the large amounts of raw materials she needs will put such pressure on the mark that only careful judgment in the apportionment of credits against the loan will enable her to keep the mark at par in foreign markets.

It is a big burden, but there is reason to believe Germany will be able to carry it. Since spring she has been able to balance her budget and has accumulated a small surplus which was used to pay emergency bonds floated for government financing."
