NO, WE DIDN'T PUBLISH THEM.

A valued reader of this paper takes us to task in a mild way for not publishing a list of the alleged bad loans of Oregon school money, conspicuously brought to the attention of the voters of this state during the recent campaign.

We openheartedly accept the criticism of our reader. We did not publish any of these alleged discrepancies. And there's a reason, and here it is:

During the early part of the attack on Mr. Kay, made at the behest of Governor Pierce and others, we took occasion to make a personal investigation of a certain tract of land in Douglas county, on which a loan of \$3,000 of state school money had been placed.

Taking this loan as a fair example of the state's effort to right an alleged wrong we dismissed the matter, apparently started for no other reason than to add prestige to the vote pulling power of Mr. Myers, Governor Pierce's avowed candidate for the office of state treasurer, and who would become a member of the state board of control, thus placing in the hands of the governor absolute authority over all state matters, broadening his powers to a considerable degree.

But, the whole mess of political porridge "back fired" and knocked the governor and his followers off their pins when Tuesday's votes were counted. Much of the bunk about bad loans of school money had not been taken seriously by the electorate and it so registered its disapproval by an overwhelming majority for Mr. Kay, further discrediting the state's investigators who had been gathering fodder for the Pierce political machine.

We do not doubt that the board of control, of which Mr. Kay was a member when the alleged bad loans were made, had placed some of the school funds on lands that are not worth the amount of the face value of the loan.

But we would like to ask if bankers, merchants, tradesmen, laborers and others do not at times make loans that are questionable? The best financiers of the country get "stripped" occasionally for various sums, and probably Tom Kay is no exception to the rule.

Everybody seems to be doing it—but the half has never been told.

The rule of thoughtless breeding and indiscriminate marketing must prevail in the turkey industry the same as in other live products of farm and range. This fact is brought to us impressively today with the announcement by local buyers that the appearance of cold turkeys in the Portland and San Francisco markets is forcing down the price.

With forest fires raging in Atlantic coast states during the prolonged warm weather prevailing there while the Pacific northwest looks upon snow and hills and draws its winter garments tighter, it would seem that man's calendar needs a radical revision to synchronize with the antics of the elements—at least in the temperate zone.

If predictions come true this state ought to "take on" a lot of new enterprises during the present year, now that the income tax has been repealed.

The cost of crime in this country is said to be more than \$3,500,000,000 annually, more than the federal government costs. We get red in the face denouncing the expenditures of the government, when all the time we are paying out more in a thousand different ways, for the expense of crime.

Local fight fans who journeyed to Sutherlin last evening to witness a boxing match were badly deceived—and the joke was on the fellow who paid the price of a ring-side seat to witness a weak attempt of two alleged principals to "pull off" a boxing bout.

Economy will be the watchword under the leadership of President Coolidge. Economy means to save a little more than you spend and would be a mighty fine slogan for many individuals, as well as the nation at large.

If people spent a little less time complaining about high prices, and a little more in studying and acting on the ads in the News-Review they would come out better.

The Coolidge vote is still adding momentum to the landslide.

CHAMPIONSHIP FOOTBALL GAME ON AT SEATTLE

(Associated Press Leased Wire.) SEATTLE, Nov. 8.—Husky was to meet Bear at the stadium here today in the annual Pacific Coast intercollegiate conference football game between the University of Washington and the University of California.

Cloudy but windy weather, forecast early today, indicated the field was to be fast and the attendance was to be a record-breaker.

California reigned a slight favorite, due to taking every game played this season.

Washington, on the other hand, has amassed a total of 215 points in all games against 18 scored by opponents compared with 24 earned by the Bears and 24 by the opponents.

The Bears team averaged 181 pounds compared with an average of 179 for the Huskies. A victory for California, practically gives the eleven the Pacific Coast conference championship, while a defeat puts the Californians on a par with Washington.

LA FOLLETTE AND DAVIS ALMOST EVEN IN OREGON

(Associated Press Leased Wire.) PORTLAND, Or., Nov. 8.—Senator Robert M. La Follette, independent candidate for president, held second place in the Oregon election, according to unofficial and official returns from all but 14 small scattering precincts in the final tabulation today by The Associated Press. The figures were: Coolidge 141,817, La Follette 67,902, Davis 67,979, Johns 1,928.

With 17 precincts missing on the report of the income tax the vote stood: For repeal 122,807, Against repeal 110,156. Majority for repeal 12,651. The final tabulation of 1742 precincts gave Coshow, for supreme judge, 107,004, and Kelly 25,219, electing Coshow jointly with Bell, who received 158,266. The referred measure to abolish oleomargarine traffic was voted down by 64,181 majority. The yes vote was 90,684 and the no vote was 154,865.

NORWAY LIKES PROHIBITION

CHRISTIANIA, Norway, Nov. 8.—One of the results of recent Norwegian elections, in which the conservative and agrarian parties secured a narrow combined majority of two seats in the Storting, will be the retention of prohibition, which was opposed by the conservatives but favored by a majority of two seats in the Storting lines.
