### NEW INDUSTRY TO COME TO ROSEBURG

Mr. and Mrs. W. G. Ross of Medford, were in the city yesterday making arrangements to remove their glove factory to this city. They secured quarters and will in a short time begin the manufacture of dress and work gloves, leather vests, leather coats, moccasins, etc. They will maintain a tannery at Medford, but later may also remove that to this city. They have found that there is more hunting in this part of the state, and that more people wish to have the skins of deer, bear, etc., tanned and made up into useful articles of wear, and besides Roseburg is more in the center of their trade territory than their present location. They will start out with six machines, which will mean the employment of that number of persons at the outset, and it is hoped that business will be so good that in a very short time the number of machines will be increased. Both Mr. and Mrs. Ross are experienced in their line of business, and their product has given universal satisfaction. Roseburg can be considered fortunate in the securing of this industry. It is just the sort of industry that the Chamber of Commerce has been working for, and it is hoped that the efforts now being put forth by the Chamber of Commerce will bring many more small industries to this city during the next year.
