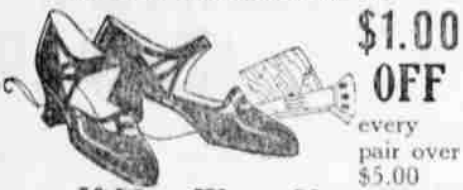

Torture Was Planned
Billburg claims it was the intention the day of the killing of the younger Looney to kidnap the elder Looney and Pedigo at the Sherman Hotel, carry them to some secluded spot, build a fire under each and force them to confess the details of the murder of William Gabel.

Billburg charged that meetings were held at different places in preparing for the Looney-Pedigo kidnapping but that plans failed when the Looney and Billburg factions met in front of the Sherman Hotel.

Others named in the Billburg affidavit as parties to the murder conspiracy are:

Walter A. Rosenfield, present mayor of Rock Island, who succeeded H. M. Schriver; Joseph Tuckles, florist; J. L. Vernon, former president of the People's National Bank; Hugh E. Curtis, president of the Rock Island Savings Bank; Morris Heagy, president of the Central Trust and Savings Bank; M. H. Sexton, president of the National Association of Minor Baseball Leagues and former Rock Island police chief, and others not identified.

Billburg alleges that Ramer promised himself and Holsapple all possible legal and political protection and that they would not be punished for anything they might do to the Looneys; that Ramer convinced Billburg and Holsapple and that they would be backed by the majority of citizens if they succeeded in ridding the community of the Looneys.

Previous quotations of 28 cents for fancy grade and 20 cents for best grade live birds remain unchanged in Roseburg today, with continuation of the request to growers to refrain from offering culls.

PORTLAND, Ore., Nov. 13.—Shipments of undergrade dressed turkeys and live birds are still being discouraged by local commission men but stocks are coming in heavy. Live turkeys are on a nominal basis with 2 cents for the extreme top. Demand for dressed birds are limited entirely to fancy No. 1 turkeys, still quoted at 29 to 31c.

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 13.—Turkeys, live young 26 @ 28c; old 22 @ 25c; dressed, young, 34 @ 35c; old 30 @ 32c; off stock 25 @ 28.

MURDER OF KATZ LATEST ANGLE IN BIG CONSPIRACY

established apparently an airtight alibi.

Charles E. Carroll, barber, husband of the woman friend of the slain man, was taken into custody shortly after midnight last night, the second man to be detained for questioning within 24 hours, but after grilling him at some length detectives announced they were satisfied he was in his barber shop when Katz was killed, and accordingly released him early today.

He was taken into custody on the strength of threats he is alleged to have made against Katz in connection with the latter's association with Mrs. Carroll. A suit for divorce filed by Mrs. Carroll recently, alleging excessive jealousy, lead officers to attach considerable significance to the purported threats.

The other suspect grilled and later released was Hal Hall, Santa Monica real estate broker, who spent several hours in the city jail yesterday as the result of an apparent discrepancy in his story of a meeting with Katz less than ten minutes before the shooting. The seeming discrepancy vanished after extensive interrogation, however, and later last night he was released with instructions to report at central police station again today in case further question should seem advisable. Carroll was also ordered to appear for further questioning today.

The trail of diamonds which investigators believe may yet solve the slaying of Katz, who seemed to have carried on all his affairs in terms of precious stones, grew more definite yesterday with the discovery of four valuable diamonds pledged by Katz in a Los Angeles pawn shop, but two safe deposit boxes which had been expected to yield a hoard of missing gems, failed to reveal aught but unimportant papers.
