THE MODERN INDIAN.

No longer is it the universal sentiment of the white man that "the only good Indian is a dead Indian." From one of extermination the Indian policy of the white man's government and the white man himself has changed to one of friendly aid. Instead of warfare there is education, for destruction has been substituted protection. From a condition of naked savagery and of cruel exploitation by unscrupulous white men the American Indian has been raised in less than a century to an appreciation of modern civilization and to relative safety from encroachment on his rights and property.

The Indian has now been brought into constant contact with the white man's civilization. His children are being taught the English language and he himself is learning the white man's trades. The life on the reservations has been preserved but not isolated. The result has been that the red man has been brought into competition with his white-skinned brother economically and forced to adjust himself socially.

While the Indians were left to themselves they slowly cast off their native traditions, customs and culture for the white man's. He preserved his art, religious rites and language only on the reservation and in the tribal tepee. But when certain well-meaning individuals and groups sought to hasten his assimilation into the white man's civilization by forbidding to him his ancient traditions and culture he rebelled and with justification. Efforts to abolish their ceremonial dances were made in the spirit of benevolent ignorance of the fact that the Indian's culture is intimately bound up with his religion and that the Indian expresses his religion in his dance. Those who have described the Indian dances as immoral may be astonished to hear that the Indian makes the same charge against the dances of the white man.

The only really serious Indian problem which confronts the nation today is that which the voluntarily-interested have constructed for themselves in their missionary zeal. All that the red man wants is to be left to live his own life. All that the white man must do to grant the Indian his wish is to be tolerant. It is the will of the general public that the Indian be left to his pottery, basket-weaving and snake dance for the sake of his own racial salvation, the preservation of his art and culture and of one of the most interesting heritages of the American people.

STILL SUPERSTITIOUS.

A news dispatch notes that the Kern County (Cal) Cattlemen's and Sheepmen's Association has contracted with a rainmaker for an inch and a half of rain, to be delivered between November 20 and December 20, for which \$4,000 is to be paid.

While the terms of the contract are not given in detail, it would seem that the rainmaker has the long end of the bargain unless he is penalized in case of failure. Perhaps he is required to execute some hocus-pocus under the semblance of doing something to earn his money, but we imagine that the chief labor in which he'll engage will consist in hoping that nature will be kind and send along the showers in a land where moisture is too often withheld. Should the rain fall in sufficient quantity the rainmaker's purse will be replenished to the extent of a neat sum whether he exerts any influence on the situation.

A few years ago professional rainmakers had quite a vogue in some arid sections, but the country has yet to hear that any of them ever was successful in producing the desired moisture. The rain may have fallen, but that of itself would not be proof of their instrumentality—rather of their good luck in having nature coincide with their schemes of bamboozling some credulous people out of good coin. Not all Americans have emerged from superstition if it is believed that man is able by incantations to coax from the sky that which nature withholds by law.

The secretary of the State Retail Merchants Association, who addressed the business men of this city last evening at a banquet, stated that the local merchant could better his condition to a very large degree if he would patronize his home paper more extensively in an advertising way. And the speaker hit the nail on the head. The home paper is plugging for the merchant all the time. It even goes so far as to turn down cold cash for a lot of foreign advertising that takes business away from the local merchant, while the local fellow seems to think that he is paying his home paper an exorbitant price for advertising when he gets this service at about half the price that the outside patron pays for a like service. There is nothing in the world that will beat outside competition as quick as the rays of publicity direct from the merchant to his patrons. And there is no other means of "delivering the goods" quite as effectively as through the columns of the local press. If you want to defeat an irregular problem meet it face to face with a good, common sense advertising campaign.

How can you expect a child to get the real benefits of a public school education when conditions are so congested in the school rooms many pupils are merely side-line spectators to the real game being presented to them? Roseburg will have to spread out on its present school building facilities if the city hopes to keep pace with other progressive communities throughout the state. A new and modern high school building will solve the problem.

FIGHTING BOLSHEVISM
LONDON, Nov. 18.—"Wide and indeed almost universal use of the motor car has provided for the United States the antidote for Bolshevism."

This is the impression brought back from his American visit by Lord Ashfield, chairman of the London underground railways.

"The motor car," he says in an interview, "has afforded the working people in the cities an opportunity of reaching the country, spending their leisure hours away from their ordinary surroundings, along with their families and friends. SILK CULTURE IN CHINA UNINJURED(Associated Press Leased Wire.)
SEATTLE, Nov. 18.—Silk culture in China has not been injured to any great extent by hostilities in China today declared by S. H. Harnes, manager of the Shanghai International Testing House, who arrived last night from China on the steamship President Grant.

"All the cocoons were gathered in June and sent to filatures," said Mr. Harnes. "When the civil war broke out in September, practically all the silk had been spun and sold. As the fighting grew closer to Shanghai the cocoons were brought in from the little plants and spun for export trade at Shanghai."

The county chamber of commerce meeting yesterday afternoon at the office of the local chamber of commerce was devoted to a thorough discussion of the many problems that are constantly coming up throughout the county, such as highways and applied taxes that may be or should be levied. A. B. Bailey, manager of the Oregon State chamber of Commerce, was present and gave a very instructive and interesting address in regard to the proper handling of the state's business resources, and the members of the county chamber were very glad to have his advice and counsel.

A number of petitions from all over the county were presented to the chamber for their consideration. These petitions, said for the county chamber to underwrite an annual home products show to be held in Roseburg about the state fair each year, at which the individual home exhibits shall be stressed. This addition in the work of having more diversified farming in the county. A committee was appointed to take the petitions to the county court and secure their cooperation. The matter of the new county booklet was brought up and the matter of financing the publication of the same explained to the entire satisfaction of all present. A proposal for a county

Another meeting will be called some time in December when it is expected a great deal of constructive work will be done, as all the cities and towns in the county were not represented at the meeting yesterday.

COURT BREAKS WILL
(Associated Press Leased Wire.)
SALEM, Nov. 18.—The supreme court today issued an opinion, written by Justice Rand, which breaks the will of the late Joseph Closest, who died in Multnomah county, February 9, 1915, and holds that the estate amounting to between \$350,000 and \$400,000 shall be distributed among the heirs as if no will had been left. The opinion reverses Judge George T. Tawell of the lower court for Multnomah county.

Closest left a will which tied up the estate in trust for a period of 25 years. Several of the heirs brought suit contesting the legality of the will, setting out that it was contrary to the statute prohibiting perpetuities, which limits a trust to 21 years, 9 months and 18 days.

The plaintiffs and appellants in the case were Alfred Adolph Closest individually, George W. Schmidt as administrator of the estate of Eugene Schmidt, deceased, George E. Schmidt, George J. Closest, and Frank R. Griff as guardian of the estates of George E. Schmidt and Christabel Schmidt. The respondents were James T. Burchell, as executor of the will and as trustee, of the trust attempts to be located by the will and Emile L. Closest, also executor, and trustee but who refused to join in the appeal.

AL SMITH HAS GOUT
FRENCH LICK, Ind., Nov. 18.—Governor Al Smith, of New York, is here for a rest, and is confined to his room with a badly swollen foot, which he considers an aftermath of the 18 holes of golf a day he has been playing.
