CANDIDATES FILE EXPENSE ACCOUNTS

Candidates at the recent general election have been rather slow in filing their expense accounts. Candidates are required to make a return on all expenses and are subject to fine if the statement covering all expenditures is not filed with the county clerk within fifteen days after election unless excused from the payment of the fine by the court. Today is the last day for making such statements, and the county clerk under the law is required to notify the district attorney of all who have failed to file their reports, and he is required to notify each candidate and unless their statements are returned within ten days may prosecute under the corrupt practice act.

J. E. Sawyers, candidate for county treasurer, spent \$53.70, according to his itemized statement, and his opponent, Roy Agee paid out \$44.20.

Ira B. Riddle, candidate for county clerk, expended \$23.70 on his campaign.

Frank L. Calkins contributed \$25 to the republican central committee, which was the only money expended by him.

For port commissioner, none of the candidates expended any money, but the "Ira" Committee spent approximately \$13 for the campaigns of J. H. Austin, G. S. Hinesdale and W. P. Reed, the money being spent for posters and mailing expense.

ACCUSED SLAYER ARRAIGNED TODAY

LA GRANDE, O., Nov. 19.—H. N. Gamble, 63, charged with first degree murder in connection with the death of William Wigglesworth of Union, Oregon, his neighbor and friend, is to be arraigned before Justice of the Peace Hugh Brady this afternoon. Gamble was still protesting his innocence this morning. Officers investigating the mystery were devoting their attention today to the bullet found lodged in the wall of Wigglesworth's home after piercing the door and the body of Wigglesworth. The bullet was lead.

Gamble had a 30 calibre Springfield rifle, with one bullet missing from a clip of steel jacketed bullets. Gamble told officers he killed a cat with the .30 bullet. The rifle barrel showed signs of having been fired recently.

The prosecution expects to try to prove that the fifth bullet killed Wigglesworth, according to the district attorney.

EGYPTIAN ARMY OFFICER INJURED

CAIRO, Nov. 19.—Two bombs one of which exploded, were thrown at Major General Sir Lee Stack, Sirdar of the Egyptian army while driving from ministry of war today.

General Stack was also attacked with revolver shots and badly wounded in the stomach. He was removed to a hospital. The three or four assailants involved in the affair eventually escaped. They first threw a bomb which failed to explode. Afterwards they fired several rounds with revolvers, hitting General Stack, his aide de camp, his chauffeur and a policeman. The medical bulletin states that General Stack's condition is serious. He is suffering from shock and has three bullet wounds in the stomach, hand and foot, respectively.

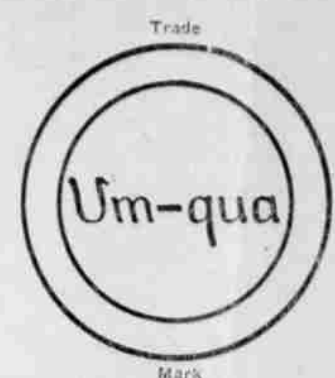
CAIRO, Egypt, Nov. 19.—An attempt to assassinate Major General Sir Lee Stack, Sirdar of the Egyptian army, by a bomb followed up with a fusillade of revolvers, just outside the ministry of war today, resulted in the serious wounding of the Sirdar. His aide de camp P. K. Campbell, the chauffeur of the Sirdar's motor car and a policeman also were wounded. The three or four men involved in the attack escaped.

The attack began with the throwing of a bomb which hit General Stack's motor car as he was driving to it from the war ministry. The bomb hit the machine, but failed to explode, falling harmlessly into the gutter.

WOMAN HURT IN WRECK

Mrs. R. J. Emley, of Oregon City, was injured this morning when her car skidded into a truck belonging to B. H. Walker, of this city. The accident occurred near the bridge south of Dillard. The woman's face was cut, a deep gash being inflicted above the eye, her two little children, who were in the machine with her were not hurt. Mrs. Emley was brought to the city and her injuries dressed by Dr. Seely and she took the stage for her home. A valuable Airside dog was also in the car and received a broken leg. The animal was brought to Dr. Hunt's veterinary hospital.
