"TOURIST BRIDES" FROM JAPAN.

The provision of the new immigration law excluding aliens ineligible to citizenship was intended to prevent, among other things, the continued entry of new wives who did their part in increasing the Japanese population of the United States by becoming mothers of average families of five.

But the Japanese have already found a way to evade this intent of the law by sending over women as tourists who play the part of wives while here for the six months stay permitted as such tourists, then return to Japan, to come again next year or the year after as tourists. So in turn we had "picture" brides, then "Kankodan" brides, and now "tourist" brides. Doubtless the visits will be so timed that the children will be born here and thus acquire American citizenship.

The following translation of a Yokohama dispatch is from the Seattle Japanese newspaper, Taihoku Nippon, Nov. 15th, under the heading "Instead of Wives being sent for, Tourist Women coming to America increasingly."

"Since the new American immigration law went into effect last July the Japanese in America have been absolutely unable to take their families with them to America. And so they have been carefully studying the matter and as a result have discovered that there is a provision of the law under which women of proper character may visit America as tourists. Recently mates for Japanese in America, under the name of tourists, have been appearing one after another expecting to spend six months of a year in America. The other day the Shosen Kaisha SS Company's Arabia Maru took an excursion party of nine women of this class. When the fixed period of their stay in America ends these women will leave their husbands and return to Japan to await opportunity to return to America again. From now on this class of women will be going back and forth across the Pacific in considerable numbers."

Mrs. Paddiford was arrested here March 22, 1923, on a grand larceny charge.

It was alleged that she had obtained large amounts of merchandise from various Hollywood merchants. She was released on her own recognizance when she promised the district attorney she would appear for trial.

However, when the case was called in superior court she failed to appear and a bench warrant was issued. At that time her attorney presented to the court a letter from her in Mexico City in which she said she would return to Los Angeles for trial.

CARDINALS AND BEARS ANXIOUS FOR BIG GAME

BERKELEY, Calif., Nov. 20.—Comparisons give little on which to base a prediction of the outcome of the big game here Saturday between Stanford and California, and conservative critics are refraining from definite prophecies. The game will determine the football supremacy of the far west.

Stanford has played seven games this season and won them all. California played eight and won all except the tie with Washington. Statistics gathered here indicate that Stanford gained about 2,132 yards in an aggregate while California's yardage is placed at 1,762. While these figures might be taken to show Stanford more aggressive and more successful on offensive followers of the game point out that the style of play adopted by the rivals has been altogether different. Stanford has been trained to carry the ball constantly to consider "the best defense an offense." California has played a punting and kicking game, relying too on the baffling effect of doing the unexpected thing.

The rivals have two of the best known coaches in the country. Stanford with Glenn Warner of California and Pittsburgh fame, California with Andy Smith, who has made the bears the most feared team in the west.

MAJ. GEN. STACK IS IMPROVED BUT FEELING IS HIGH

(Associated Press Licensed Wire.)

CAIRO, Egypt, Nov. 20.—Major General Sir Lee Stack, the Sirdar of the Egyptian army who was wounded by assassins yesterday passed a good night and there was some improvement noted but his condition this morning was still very serious.

Six or more gunmen using both bombs and automatic pistols, were concerned in the attack and the Sirdar was struck by three bullets suffering wounds in the abdomen, one hand and one foot. After an operation for transfusion of blood last night the surgeons expressed hope for his recovery.

The Egyptian premier Zagloul in a statement to the newspapers declared the government would take every possible step to solve the mystery of the crime and capture the assassins.

"The outrage," he continued, "will cause a very bad impression with every one every where. I deplore this crime. I do not know to what end the criminals are acting or to what class they belong, but I am convinced that its authors want to disturb the peace of the country. They should not attain their ends."

The newspapers publish many messages, indicating universal repudiation of the outrage.

LONDON, Nov. 20.—The attempt in Cairo of the life of Sir Stack Sirdar of the Egyptian army has aroused great indignation here and most of the morning newspapers comment severely, demanding that the government take prompt decision and action.

While Premier Zagloul Pasha and the Egyptian government are acquitted of having desired, much less prompted, the outrage, it is contended that they were to a great extent morally responsible for their alleged fostering of extremism and hostility to the British.

The Times says the Egyptian government must be taught that its practice of "pandering to the extremists for political advantage" cannot be tolerated. The paper continues:

This is no case for a leisurely exchange of diplomatic notes; it is a case of immediate and energetic action. Such action was effective in the Sudan troubles, and the conservative government will be expected to act at least as promptly and firmly as did Mr. MacDonald's government.

Some of the other papers demanded that the British government withdraw some or all of the concessions already made to Egypt. Even the liberal organs, which comment less drastically, treat the incident as grave and call upon Zagloul Pasha imperatively to suppress the terrorism.
