FIND TRIPLE KILLING

 SPOKANE, Wash., Nov. 20.—A triple killing, supposed to have occurred yesterday was disclosed by the police here today when the bodies of George Howard, aged 24, and Mrs. Carrie MacMackin, 35, were found in a rooming house and the body of Howard's wife, aged 20, was found in a hotel room. All are negroes.

Howard, who was separated from his wife called at her hotel yesterday, the proprietor said, and left when informed she was not in. His body and that of Mrs. MacMackin, who also was said to have been separated from her husband were found when numerous telephone calls for them at their rooming house attracted the suspicion of the landlord toward Howard's room, afterward police sought Howard's wife and discovered her body.

The officers believe Howard killed his wife and then Mrs. MacMackin and himself.

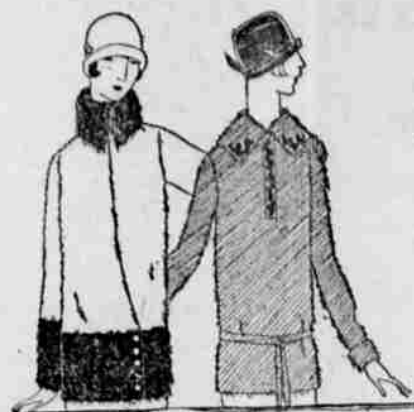

THE COMPANY

The history of The California Oregon Power Company shows a substantial growth in facilities and earnings resulting from the large sums of money invested in its properties and from the development of the territory which it serves.

Steady Growth in Customers Served

The territory now served by The California Oregon Power Company includes parts of Jackson, Josephine, Klamath and Douglas Counties in Oregon, and Siskiyou County and parts of Shasta and Trinity Counties in California. This is an area equal to the combined areas of the States of Massachusetts, Rhode Island and Connecticut.
