CHEMISTS TRY SEEK CAUSE OF WOMAN'S DEATH

Officers Believe Body Was Placed in Furnace After Life Was Gone.

LUNGS ARE EXAMINED

May Have Suicided and Then Someone Placed Body in Fire to Dispose of It.

(Associated Press Leased Wire.) CANTON, Ohio, Nov. 21.—Hoping further questioning of relatives of Mrs. Addie Sheatsley, wife of C. V. Sheatsley, pastor of Christ's church, Rexley, near Columbus, Ohio, who found the charred body of his wife in the furnace at the Sheatsley home Monday night bring some clue which would solve the mysterious cremation, Prosecutor John H. King of Franklin county (Columbus), today continued examination of Mr. Sheatsley and his four children.

Funeral services for Mrs. Sheatsley were held at Paris, near here, yesterday.

Prosecutor King is also waiting a report of Columbus analytical chemists, who made an analysis of the lungs and aerophages of Mrs. Sheatsley, which Mr. King said would be forwarded to him here today.

"I am of the opinion," he said, "that eventual disclosures of the facts will indicate that she did not choose this method to take her life. I do not say, understand, that another killed her. That is possible, of course, but I am more and more inclined to believe that her body was placed in the furnace after life had passed from the body."

Mrs. Lydia Sponseller, 80 year old mother of the victim in a statement said that the Sheatsley family, with whom she lived for a number of years, "was the most agreeable family I have ever seen. Addie was good and kind to me and so was her husband."

LAND OWNERS PROSPEROUS

Are Better Able to Pay Taxes This Year Than in Past Seasons.

DELINQUENCY IS LOW

Only Eight Per Cent of the Taxes Outstanding Instead of 10 or 12 as Has Been in Past.

That the land owners of Douglas county are more prosperous this year than in any other recent year, and that the expected era of prosperity is evidently approaching, is the conclusion drawn by a survey of the tax receipts for the year. With five weeks left in the year the tax receipts are already over any previous year since the war and there are fewer delinquencies than for many seasons past.

Not only have this year's taxes been paid better than before but a large sum has been received on delinquencies from 1923, according to Charles Roberts, tax deputy clerk in charge of the tax department. Taxes this year were collected on the 1923 assessment roll, which set forth the amount of \$1,200,254.47 to be collected this year. Up to the present time, including all money received on the 1923 roll in both the first and last half years, the department has taken in \$1,014,054.89. This leaves slightly more than 8 per cent of the total county tax delinquency. The delinquencies have been running from 10 to 12 per cent in recent years. The total delinquency this year was \$1,189,848.58. Last year the tax levied on the 1922 assessment roll was delinquent by \$104,705.67. During this year \$41,608.43 have been paid on this delinquency. The total delinquency on all tax rolls amounts to about \$125,000. Practically all delinquent taxes on land is eventually collected, Mr. Roberts stated. About all the tax that is never received is on

personal tax imposed upon persons who own no real estate. Some persons have a small amount of personal property, upon which a tax is levied, and then before the tax is collected they sell all of their belongings and move to some other county or state, and the county levies the amount imposed. The law gives the assessor the right to collect such tax at the time the assessment is made, but this entails a mass of detail, and quite frequently losses are incurred in spite of that provision.

Each year the amount received on delinquent taxes from preceding rolls is sufficient to make up the shortage for the current year, so that the sum actually turned over to the treasurer, is very close to the amount levied.

The work in the tax collection department has been simplified a great deal recently by taxpayers mailing in their payments. It used to be that taxpayers thought it positively necessary to make their payments personally and in gold or silver, but in later years they have grown more and more into the habit of sending in their payments by mail. This gives the clerks additional time, and reduces the chance of error, for the mail can be worked up at the convenience of the collecting force, and the entire made regularly and in order, and sufficient time taken to keep a check on the receipts. Although it lengthens the period of tax collection, yet this is more than offset by the fact that the county is not forced to employ several additional clerks during the tax collecting period, as used to be done.

This year the tax department has been able to keep up in excellent shape with its turnover, and the money has been transferred to the treasurer with practically no delay. This is a great advantage as it permits the treasurer to keep all bills paid without issuing interest bearing warrants, which saves the county a large sum of money.

DEFEATED GENERAL LEADING REBELS

(Associated Press Leased Wire.) MEXICO CITY, Nov. 21.—General Angel Flores, governor of Sinaloa state and unsuccessful candidate in the last presidential election has revolted against to private dispatches from Mazatlan to the Newspaper El Universal here.

The dispatches state that General Flores left Culiacan, Sinaloa, Wednesday night in an automobile accompanied by seven followers for the mountains along the Sinaloa boundary where General Miramontes awaited him at the head of a few hundred men.

Confirmation in unavailable in official quarters and General Hector Almada, chief of staff, of the military commandant of the Valley of Mexico was inclined last night to deny the report.

General Flores was overwhelmingly defeated in the Mexican presidential election of last July carrying only his home state of Sinaloa and receiving a popular vote of 250,000 as compared with 1,340,000 for General Plutarco Elias Calles. General Calles is to be inaugurated November 3.

CONSTRUCT POWER PLANT

Last May announcement was made by the California Oregon Power Company that they would commence immediately the construction of a new power plant at Copco on the Klamath River, California, together with the construction of a 110,000 volt transmission line from Copco to Delta, California, a distance of 77 1/2 miles.

The November issue of The Volt, which has just been published and distributed, tells of the progress of this work. The company has made a record in the construction of the new transmission line which was completed on November 10th. This line will be placed in operation immediately—the current transmitted over it being energy generated at the other plants on the Copco system.
