WILL PAROLE MAN

OSHING, N. Y., Nov. 21.—
The state board of parole ordered the release on parole from Sing Sing prison on Christmas eve of William H. Anderson, former state superintendent of the anti-Saloon League.

Anderson will be released three months before the expiration of the minimum sentence imposed upon him after his conviction for third degree forgery last January.

Anderson's release is due to the action of the state board of parole, which yesterday reversed a ruling it made a month ago that prisoners must serve at least one year before they may be paroled for good behavior.

MOTHER HANGS THREE CHILDREN AND SELF

MASSILON, Ohio, Nov. 21.—The bodies of Mrs. Donald Burkhart and her three children were found hanging in their home by the husband and father, Donald Burkhart, when he returned from a hunting trip today. Burkhart could give no explanation of the tragedy. Police are investigating.

Burkhart said he found a note on the dining room table bidding farewell and then went to the cellar and found the three lifeless forms hanging. All the windows and doors in the house were locked. The tragedy occurred sometime between 7 o'clock, when Mr. Burkhart left the house and his return at 1 o'clock.
