TURKEY SALES ARE BELOW THE NORMAL

The peak of the Thanksgiving turkey business will be reached today, according to dealers of this city, who are in touch with the situation. While turkey deliveries have been fairly good, the total of birds offered for sale will not come up to the usual number by quite a good deal. It was said by several buyers this afternoon. This is attributed to the fact that not only in this city but in the surrounding counties, but in a good many instances they have not been considered in a prime condition, hence farmers have not offered them. It is generally conceded that the bulk of the birds for the Thanksgiving trade will be delivered today, although a good many will come in Saturday. Generally speaking, so dealers said this afternoon, the birds offered have been nice and fat, and some of the stock offered was particularly fine and brought top notch prices. While buyers in the city were paying 28 cents today for prime birds, not one of them was willing to guarantee that the price would hold good for tomorrow. Some of the buyers expressed an opinion that there might possibly be a drop in prices. Others alleged that a lower price to growers was highly improbable. One buyer who buys heavily each year, was firm in his conviction that there would be no drop, but all were of the opinion that 28 cents was probably the highest figure that would be paid for Thanksgiving turkeys.

Dressed turkeys are being received today and tomorrow at all railway points in the county, but it is believed that the total of the turkey business will fall considerably short of the volume done in other years.
