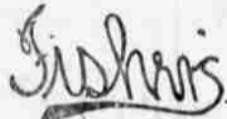

PALACE OF SWEETS

INSTALLS NEW PLANT

One of the newest refrigerating plants installed here in some time is now in operation at the Palace of Sweets, and was started yesterday. This is the first one of its kind in the state outside of Portland, and Manager Cloud is keeping his place right up to the minute. This plant just installed is electrically operated, and coils carry the cold temperatures to the ice cream containers, the fountain and to storage boxes for brick ice cream. The device does away entirely with the use of broken ice around the ice cream containers, as no "backing" of the product is necessary. The motor is so connected up that when a certain low temperature is obtained, the power automatically shuts down, thus economizing on electricity.
