## GETTING RESULTS.

Many people have gone on to business success as the result of their persuasiveness. They draw business like a magnet, people wish them well for their pleasing qualities, and their fluent gift of talk makes almost any proposition look good. Yet good salesmanship demands something more than ability to talk and a winsome manner. One must have something to talk about. There are many people who never have been good talkers, who have yet been able to achieve success because their results talked for them. The articles that they sold or made had a superior adaptation to human needs. They seemed to know by closer observation what people wanted. These people would labor day and night until they had succeeded in learning the secrets of their trade. They knew how to give the public what it wanted. When they produced their superior article, the public could see for itself that they had the advantage. It is hard to win success in the business world without this devotion to one's calling. One must concentrate his attention on his work, know it a little better than the other fellow, must be planning and contriving while others are having a good time. The road to success is not an easy path for most people. One may not spend such very long hours in a workshop or office, but the thought must go into one's work during many of those hours which other people spend in playing. ## OIL SHOWING AT LEEPER DOME

First Strata of Oil Sands Found at Depth of About 600 Feet.

## PUTTING IN CASING

Will Shut Off Water Before Attempting to Determine Amount of Oil Tapped—Samples Taken.

A fine showing of oil at a distance of less than 600 feet, is causing jubilant spirits among those connected with the Leeper Dome oil well project. Work of casing off the water in the hole was started this morning, so that the well may be explored and the value of the strike determined. It is not expected that the oil uncovered will be of any great value, but according to those connected with the well it gives absolute promise of oil at lower depths and fully proves the fact that the location has been correctly chosen.

The drill at less than 600 feet struck a sand strata. Samples of the sand show the presence of a considerable quantity of oil. This is a high grade paraffine base oil, which is much more valuable than the black, or asphalt base oil, although usually not found in such large quantities.

It is impossible to determine the extent of the oil deposit, until the water is cased off, as there is about 400 feet of water in the hole. Casing is being hauled to the site today, and there will be no more drilling until the casing is in place.

"Beyond question the samples taken from the well show paraffine base oil," W. L. Cobb, manager of the company said today. "There is an abundance of gas, bubbles coming up through the well showing of oil, although we cannot tell how much until we can case off the water."

"We are proceeding very carefully now, for a slip might mean disaster. The samples from the hole show that we are on the edge of a strata of oil bearing sand. We raised some of this sand, and even after washing it thoroughly, extracted a quantity of oil. We are keeping a watchman over the hole night and day to prevent anything from happening which might hinder progress. Just as fast as possible we will case off the water and will then make a test to determine the flow of oil in the sand strata."

Mr. Cobb explains that in wells of this type there are usually three layers of oil sands. The first two carry small quantities of oil, but the large deposit, and the one where the greatest returns are to be derived, is the third strata.

The geologists who aided in locating the Leeper Dome predicted the first oil bearing sands at a depth of 750 feet.

"The strike proves conclusively that the location has been properly chosen," Mr. Cobb says, "and is proof that the formations are just as we thought them. This shows the formation is right for a deposit of oil, and the fact that this first sand strata carries oil is proof of more oil at lower depths. All of the persons employed at the well are jubilant and optimistic. Our hopes have been gratified by the finding of such a good showing and we are putting forth a strong effort to determine the amount of oil which has been tapped."

Drilling will be held up until the shaft can be cased. The drill is still working in rock, with traces of sand showing. If the drill was allowed to drop into the sand layer, there would be no rock shoulder upon which to set the casing and it would be necessary to pour in cement, and then drill into that again, in order to form a base for the casing, as drilling is suspended temporarily.

As soon as the casing is placed a hole will be bored into the sand strata and tests will be made to find out the amount of oil present. Now that the location has been proven geologically correct, Mr. Cobb says that the drilling will be pushed as rapidly as possible, but all indications now point to a successful outcome of the project.

## FAVOR ANTI-JAP BILL

EL PASO, Tex., Nov. 20.—The American Federation of Labor expressed today its opposition to any attempt to alter the Japanese exclusion clause of the immigration law. The resolution was offered by R. W. Robinson of the California Federation of Labor.

"We are unalterably opposed to exclusion by treaty in the place of exclusion by law," the resolution said. It was approved without debate.

The convention reaffirmed its

approval of legislative proposals to convene congress immediately after the general election and to abolish the short session for "lame ducks."

The convention unanimously approved a report of the committee on legislation pledging support of the proposed constitutional amendment of Senator Norris of Nebraska. Under which newly elected senators and representatives would take their seats in January following the November election, instead of in December of the next year.

The Norris amendment already has been approved by the senate and is before the house in the form of a resolution by Representative White of Kansas. Reclassification of federal employees along the lines proposed in the bill of Senator Stanford of Oregon, now on the senate calendar, was approved.

## APOLOGY ASKED OF EGYPT BY GREAT BRITAIN

Note Also Demands Indemnity for Slaying of Major General Stack.

## ASSASSIN IS CAUGHT

Victim Is Buried Today Amid Scenes of Impressive Military Display and Solemnity.

CAIRO, Nov. 22.—A British note handed to Zakiul Pasha, the Egyptian premier, today demanded a "proper apology" in connection with the killing of Major General Sir Lee Stack, the sirdar, and an indemnity of 500,000 pounds sterling.

The note demands the prohibition of political demonstrations and withdrawal of Egyptian officers, and units from the Sudan, the Sudanese troops to come under the control of the Sudan government proper.

The note furthermore holds in reserve a revision of the conditions governing the retirement of British officials from Egypt and insists upon the retention of British judicial and financial advisers.

VALETTA, Malta, Nov. 22.—The first battalion of the East Lancashire regiment has been suddenly ordered to Egypt and will sail next Wednesday.

LONDON, Nov. 22.—A special dispatch from Cairo says an alleged assassin of Sir Lee Stack, had been arrested after a confession by the taxicab driver who was held following the shooting of the sirdar.

CAIRO, Nov. 22.—The body of Major General Sir Lee Stack, governor general of the Sudan and sirdar of the Egyptian army, victim of assassins, was laid to rest today amid scenes made impressive by military display and solemnity. Crowds lined the streets, held back by troops.

In the gathering at All Saints Church, were Field Marshall Viscount Allenby, British high commissioner in Egypt; Lady Allenby, who is on a tour of Egypt; Prime Minister Zakiul Pasha of the Egyptian government; the members of the Egyptian cabinet and the entire diplomatic corps in full regalia, as well as the leading representatives of every foreign community in Cairo.

LONDON, Nov. 22.—The British public is expecting and the majority of the London press is demanding that the government take firm action toward Egypt in connection with the assassination in Cairo of Major General Sir Lee Stack, Governor General of the Sudan and Sirdar of the Egyptian army. The opinion is widely expressed that, notwithstanding the Egyptian officials in compliance with their expressions of regret, the murder was actually a political crime originating in a desire to oust the British from the Sudan.

The Daily Mail editorially demands that Great Britain revoke the grant of independence to Egypt, which it maintains has shown a lack of political capacity.

## DOUGLAS COUNTY BREAD TEAM 3RD

At the state prune bread baking contest held in Portland during the Pacific International Livestock Exposition the Douglas county team composed of Elizabeth Renner and Wilma Howard from the Greens district won third place in competition with fifteen other teams. The Jackson county team won first with a score of 94.1, second place was awarded to Malheur on a score of 93.8 and the Douglas county score was 91.1-3. The closeness of these scores shows how keen the competition was and is proof that the Douglas county representatives did very creditable work.

The winning team was given a free trip to Chicago to participate in the National bread baking contest for club girls. The second and third team received a silver and bronze medal respectively, as well as a cash prize.

The team representing Oregon at the national contest at Chicago will distribute one pound cartons of Oregon prunes during the bread baking contest and it is believed that the advertising received in this way will be very much worth while.

The Douglas county team was selected at the time of the Home Products Show in Roseburg when a county bread baking contest was held. The girls from Greens won in this contest and since that time have baked prune bread regularly each week under the coaching of their mothers, Mrs. Fred Renner and Mrs. J. R. Howard, who accompanied the girls on their trip to Portland. These girls were eligible for this work on account of the fact that they were members of the girls cooking club at Greens last year. Green community has always been quite active in boys and girls work.

Mr. J. H. Booth, of the Douglas National Bank financed the trip for the Douglas county representatives to the state contest at Portland. Mr. Booth felt that a prune bread baking contest was worthy of the support given in this way.

The bread baked by the Douglas county girls was judged to be the best produced by any of the sixteen teams in the contest, and took the first prize. Each of the teams, however was required to give a lecture as a part of the demonstration and the Douglas county girls scored lower than the two teams which placed first and second because the better lecture given by those teams.
