BLOODY MURDERS
OCCUR IN RUSSIA

(Associated Press Local Wire)

MOBILE, Fla., Nov. 26.—(Associated Press Local Wire.)—A mob of about 400 men, many of them armed with revolvers and shotguns, today raided the city of Pithia, Greece, on the Black Sea, with the purpose of killing the Greek consul and his family.

The mob, which was led by a man named Vassilios, entered the city at about 10 o'clock and began to shoot at the consul's residence. The consul, who was named Vassilios, was killed by a bullet in the chest. His wife and two children were also killed. The mob then looted the city and burned several houses.

A famine is predicted in parts of Russia this winter, food being scarce in many parts. Members of the crew who were on the ship, reported that they had seen the consul's body lying on the ground.

ATHLETICS SAID TO BE IMPORTANT

(Associated Press Local Wire)

CHICAGO, Nov. 26.—(Associated Press Local Wire.)—Athletics have come to occupy an important place in the educational program of the nation, because there are educational values in athletics. Major John L. Griffith, commissioner of athletics in the western conference said in an address last night.

Commissioner Griffith's remarks were in answer to the theories advanced by Dr. Alexander Meiklejohn, former president of Amherst college, who in an address in the east, urged the subordination of athletics in college and university education.

Commissioner Griffith said it was to be regretted that the alumni and students are not more enthusiastic about scientific and literary attainments of their various colleges, but if the new ideal is expected that the function of schools and universities is to train students for life work, then it must be conceded that through athletics certain fundamental lessons are taught both players and spectators that are worth while.

"Do you suppose that if football could be wiped off the earth, that those who witness the games would spend their Saturday afternoons in libraries and art galleries, instead of filling stadiums as they do," Commissioner Griffith asked.

"There seems to be an erroneous idea concerning the athletic field," Commissioner Griffith said. "The fact is that there are not more than two or three in the country who receive a salary of \$5,000 or more. This is not a tremendous income compared with the salaries of doctors, lawyers or engineers. They are paid \$5,000, \$10,000, \$15,000, and the average salary is not more than \$3,000 a year."

"Athletic ability has been immeasurably improved in the last 25 years under the best of conditions," Commissioner Griffith said.

POTENTATE WAS
VICTIM OF GAME
TO EXTORT MONEY

LONDON, Nov. 26.—The Paris hotel apartment zone in which it is alleged, "Mr. A," a wealthy Indian prince was trapped with pretty Mrs. C. E. Robinson, wife of a former bookmaker, was described in detail today when Monsieur Noel Newton, who yesterday testified that he had joined in a conspiracy to extort a huge sum from the potentate, resumed the stand in the trial of Mr. Robinson's suit against the Midland Bank.

The whole affair was well arranged in advance, Newton said, by "Mr. A's" aide de camp, Mrs. Robinson, with the active assistance of a Mrs. Boyan, who was her confidante, had previously suggested that the scene should be enacted in Paris rather than in London where Mrs. Robinson first became intimate with the prince, Newton declared.

The prince told the court he had received final instructions, the night before, and that early in the morning he went to the hotel, where, unchallenged, he proceeded directly to the prince's suite, opened the door, and assuming the role of Mrs. Robinson's husband, informed the potentate he had gotten the evidence he wanted.

He said Mrs. Robinson, carrying out her role, attacked him, shouting:

"My brute of a husband!"

and that the prince finally intervened.

So great was the interest in Newton's testimony that a line formed outside the law courts shortly after midnight. There were several women waiting in the line some of them engaged in their Christmas knitting.

DIRIGIBLE SAILS BACK TO HANGAR

WASHINGTON, Nov. 26.—The American navy boasts another giant of the air today on its list of formally commissioned ships. ZR-3, the designation under which the great German-built dirigible, dard the expanse of the Atlantic waters to reach her destined home land, has passed the navy's rolls, where reads instead "Los Angeles," a name accorded with the peaceful mission she must follow under the agreement of her builders.

The airship was thus rechristened yesterday, by Mrs. Calvin Coolidge, wife of the nation's president, after charming the capitals eye and stirring pride with a graceful descent from her hangar at Lakehurst, N. J., where returning, she reposes today awaiting a future of ambitions hopes and plans. Although designed for non-military purposes only the giant ship will remain for the present in the keeping of the navy until her future career has been definitely marked out.
