LA MERE INQUEST

RESUMED TODAY

The inquest into the death of Wm. La Mere, who was killed Tuesday evening near the Riverside store, when he was struck by an automobile driven by S. S. Shell of Oakland, was continued this afternoon. Dr. Hoover testified that he had made a further examination of the body, and that he had found the thoracic and abdominal cavities filled with blood as a result of injuries to the lungs and liver. One lung was punctured by a broken rib, causing a severe hemorrhage, and the liver was torn and mangled. The doctor stated that in his opinion the direct cause of death was the internal hemorrhage, caused by the car passing over the body.

BEND DEFEATS SEASIDE

BEND, Or., Nov. 28.—Bend high school football team defeated the Seaside high school eleven here yesterday by a score of 18 to 0. Three touchdowns were made by Bend in the last quarter, but they failed to kick goal after the touchdowns.

APPROPRIATION FOR DEFICIENCY AUTHORIZED TODAY

SALEM, Or., Nov. 28.—The state emergency board today authorized a deficiency appropriation of \$18,516.89 at the request of state treasurer Myers to meet state obligations on interest guarantees for bond issues of irrigation districts. The deficiency is caused by delinquent taxes in the districts.

The board authorized \$4500 to be applied on salaries for the state hospital for the insane. This was necessitated by an error of the ways and means committee of the 1923 legislature in segregation of amounts appropriated for the hospital. While the hospital will have a surplus of funds amounting to between \$30,000 and \$40,000 to turn back to the general fund, this will be from the time of subsistence and general expenses. Heretofore salaries have been included under this head and had it been done in that way by the ways and means committee there would be no deficiency in the salary item, in accordance with explanations made at the meeting today.

Because of this dire condition, Oregon irrigation projects have advanced the argument that the state should take over their bonded obligations to save them from "being robbed by grafters." This argument brought down the wrath of Governor Pierce who declared that such a plan was beyond reason. He declared it would take the homes away from the farmers who are fortunate enough to own homes.

"Go ahead and put it over," said the governor. "You have the power and all you have to do is to get the newspaper behind your scheme. Denton Burdick will be in the saddle this winter and it will be a problem for him to work out."

THANKSGIVING BALL WAS BIG SUCCESS

The annual Thanksgiving ball held last night by the local national guard company was a decided success in every respect. The floor was crowded by dancers, all reporting a delightful time. Several feature numbers were presented and were well received. A professional dancer gave a short dancing skit during one intermission, and two juvenile entertainers presented a charming act. The national guard company expects to hold dances regularly during the winter months.

PIONEER OAKLAND WOMAN IS DEAD

Mrs. Sarah E. Thomas, aged 80 years, a pioneer resident of Oakland, passed away last night. Mrs. Thomas, who for the past half century conducted a hotel at Oakland, was falling in health for several months before her death.

Mrs. Thomas was the daughter of an old pioneer settler. Dr. Leland Hall, who came to Oregon from England many years ago, taking up his residence at English Settlement, about ten miles east of Oakland, where he lived for a number of years, farming and practicing medicine. Sarah was his oldest daughter, and when quite young was married to Mr. Conrad, a man of another pioneer family, quite prominent in the state. M. A. Conrad, of Looking Glass, is a son by that marriage. Following the death of her husband she was married to Richard Thomas, a merchant in Old Oakland. Following his death she constructed the hotel building in Oakland, where she lived with her daughter, Miss Mary Thomas, until her death.

She leaves her son, two daughters, Miss Mary Thomas of Oakland, Mrs. Harry Von Draethen of Spokane; one brother, C. M. Hall of Oakland, and two sisters, Mrs. Mary Smith of Oakland and Mrs. G. A. Taylor of Portland.

The funeral will be held at Oakland on Sunday afternoon at 2 p. m.
