CHILDREN VISIT TOMB OF LINCOLN

(Associated Press Local Wire.) SPRINGFIELD, Ill., Nov. 28.—Disembarking this morning in the old Wabash depot, where Abraham Lincoln made his farewell address on leaving to become president of the United States, a twentieth century children's crusade, 1,800 strong, paid Abraham Lincoln one of the most impressive tributes ever offered in Springfield.

The children who came as the guests of the local Kiwanis club and the Kiwanis clubs of 23 cities in Iowa, were met at the depot by a large delegation of Springfield school children and the Springfield high school band. A number of local students of Lincoln were present to point out the tablet marking the spot on which the farewell address was made and to explain the importance of that message and the events leading up to it.

Warm and eager, in spite of a crust of snow that covered portions of their train, 1200 Iowa school children, here on a pilgrimage to Lincoln's tomb, arrived in Springfield shortly before noon today. All three sections of the train were delayed by a heavy snow storm in Missouri and the third section of the train was not expected to arrive until after noon. The children were greeted at the train by a large delegation of Springfield school children, headed by the fifty piece Springfield high school band. An ambulance brought to the train by the local Kiwanis club to care for any of the children that might be ill, drove away empty as the pilgrims to the various points of Lincoln interest in the city started. The schedule called for visits to the Lincoln home, the scene of his famous Springfield addresses, the old country house and Lincoln's tomb.

GRAND-CHILDREN OF HARDINGS ARE HEIRS

(Associated Press Local Wire.) MARION, Ohio, Nov. 28.—Jeanne and George De Wolfe, grand children of the late Mrs. Warren G. Harding, are left the bulk of her estate, under her will filed for probate here today. The will makes special bequests to friends and relatives aggregating \$55,000 and leaves the residue of the estate to the grand children who live here. It was generally believed that Mrs. Harding's estate would total more than \$500,000. The grand children are not to come into their inheritance until they are 28 years of age. The will establishing a trust fund. Jeanne is 15 years of age and George is 12.

Mrs. Malcolm Jennings, of Columbus, a great friend of Mrs. Harding, was given \$5,000; Dr. Carl W. Sawcort, at whose sanitarium Mrs. Harding died was left \$10,000. Stenographers at the White House while the Hardings were there, Mrs. Harding's secretary and others were given bequests of from \$500 to \$2,000. Mrs. Harding's will was drawn up on October 14, 1924. In it she elects to accept the appraisal of her husband's estate, which was tentatively placed at \$500,000. No final appraisal has been made public of Mrs. Harding's estate.
