COUNTY PLANS

HOSPITAL WARD

In the event the budget item of \$2,000 for hospital costs is finally approved, it is the plan to construct a hospital ward at the county home to take care of indigent patients. It was announced today, hereafter the county has had no place to provide hospitalization for persons without funds, and has been forced to send them to the local hospital, where the costs were very heavy.

In the proposed budget there is an item for \$2,000 and if this is a part of the final budget, it is planned to take one-half of the money and construct a ward at the county home, and all hospital cases will be placed there under the care of the county health unit, the remaining amount being used for medicines and medical supplies.

WHAT GOOD SCHOOLS MEAN TO THE COMMUNITY

Essays, Emphasizing the Value of School Education, Written by Some of the Young Students Attending the Roseburg County Schools, in Observance of Education Week.

I was in the schoolroom. I didn't want to be there very much. It was warm, so I must have
