COMPENSATION FOR STAY-AT-HOMES.

Many people hear almost with envy about neighbors or friends who are planning to take expensive trips this winter and visit famous resorts and other unfamiliar scenes. Yet the folks who wander around very freely may not be any happier than others. One lady who has traveled much remarked recently that she has missed a good deal by being away from home so much. She had gotten out of touch with conditions in her home community. She felt that many interesting things had been going on in which she had had no share. Probably she had failed to make new friends among her home people, and perhaps had not kept up with her old friends as she wished she might. The people who think they have to go away from home to make friends are mistaken. Friends that one wins in traveling are very pleasant, but they do not usually stick. To make permanent friendships, people usually have to be engaged in the same activities for an extended period. An occasional travel trip broadens people out by giving them a better understanding of the points of view that prevail in other localities. Up to a certain point travel should be encouraged. Yet people who get a taste for constant travel run the risk that they can never settle down and be happy in every day surroundings. Many of these people become fussy about their comforts. If some little thing is wrong with their food or lodging in some hotel, they are rendered uncomfortable, and they overlook a hundred pleasures just for one point of discomfort. If they get that spirit, their travel has done them more harm than good. There is something in steady attention to work at one's home job that makes one appreciate blessings and learn not to over emphasize trifles.

President Coolidge, addressing the national conference on Utilizing Forest Products, warned the people against the appalling waste of our timber resources. The average person can do several things to help stop this waste. When he goes on an automobile, camping, or hunting trip, he can refrain from starting fires in any place where they could spread to timber land. Or if he must camp in such places, he can throw water on his fire until every spark is out. Also he can throw his matches and cigarette ends into places where they can't communicate fire. If campers had always done thus, building materials would not be so costly.

Speaking on automobile traffic problems at the conference of governors at Jacksonville, Fla., Gov. Cox of Massachusetts remarked that the pedestrians have the chief right in the use of highways. It will surprise the pedestrians in many cities to know that they have any rights which speeding motorists are bound to respect. At least, that they have the right to do anything more than wait until the cars have passed and then hurry across the street, in hopes that a grand jump will land them safely. It's about time that more thought was given to the people who have to cross the streets in centers of population.

Young women who have business positions are forming clubs in some places. Many of these girls are supposed to spend about all their time chasing after the men. That does them an injustice. The majority of them are more interested in their jobs and gaining promotion, and a fellow has to do something other than wear the latest style necktie to make them conscious of his existence. When young women organize in clubs, it is usually a sign that they would rather add to their power of attainment than create havoc among the male sex.

The Canby, Ore., school marm who "took over" one of her 16-year-old pupils for a husband has been dismissed by the school board of that district on account of her recent matrimonial venture. In retaliation the newlywed is going to law in an effort to hold the board to its contract. Falling heir to such a prize really ought to satisfy the school marm's aspirations to the queen's taste. She better start a program of ways and means to keep the boy on the job.

At Parkersburg, West Virginia, yesterday a judge sentenced a man, 60 years of age, to hang for assaulting his 14-year-old stepdaughter. The sentence was a fitting tribute to a degenerate and one that might be duplicated by many a judge when meting out just punishment to beasts responsible for such a heinous crime.

DEMUTHUS SUSTAINED

KANSAS CITY, Mo., Dec. 2.—Federal Judge Albert L. Harvey today sustained the demurrer of Walter S. Dickey, owner and editor of the Kansas City Journal-Post and Ralph Ellis, general managing editor, to indictment charging illegal publication of federal income tax returns.

DISPUTES OVER BOUNDARY LINE SAID SERIOUS

Free State May Withdraw From Commission and Repudiate Treaty.

CABINET MAY QUIT

Government May Be Handed Over to De Valera, Republican Leader and His Friends.

LONDON, Dec. 2.—A sensational story concerning the possible effects in southern Ireland of the dispute over the competence of the boundary commission set up by the Anglo Irish treaty is published by the Daily Mail from its Dublin correspondent.
The commission is meeting here on Thursday to hear the Free State's case regarding the boundary. If it becomes evident, the correspondent says that the commission will concede nothing more than a mere announcement of the boundary, the Free State's representative on the commission will resign and his withdrawal will be followed by the resignation of the entire Free State cabinet, the government to be handed over to Eamonn De Valera, the republican leader, and his friends.

This means, the correspondent adds, the repudiation of the treaty.

BELFAST, Dec. 2.—All the Irish newspapers today contain announcements from the boundary commission that it is willing to receive representations in writing from "public bodies, associations, or individuals resident in Ireland," before December 21. It is stated that the commission contemplates holding a session in Ireland.

DUBLIN, Dec. 2.—A current report that the Free State cabinet will resign and hand over the government to Eamonn De Valera and his supporters in the event of certain developments in connection with the Irish boundary commission is ridiculed in well informed Free State circles. The Dublin newspaper today contains advertisements inviting representations in writing from public bodies, associations or individuals on the subject of the boundary. These announcements being similar to those simultaneously made public in Ulster.

The Free State government has appointed counsel to state its case to the committee. The statements are to be laid before the committee not later than December 31.

BELFAST, Dec. 2.—A report that the Free States representative on the boundary commission may resign and other serious consequences follow if the commission fails to deal drastically with the retracting of the boundary between northern and southern Ireland is received with skepticism in authoritative circles in Belfast. It is believed here that any difficulties in the commission will not arrive until after the Free State presents its case and meantime the commission is delicately feeling its way.

As to the attitude of the Free State government, there is growing belief that President Cosgrave's illness will necessitate his resignation. It is asserted in Ulster circles that while O'Higgins, his logical successor, desires to maintain friendly relations with the British government and uphold the Anglo-Irish treaty, some of his colleagues apparently are not animated with the same scheme.

this gold backing to come from the sale of stock in the bank, and from the

"B. Organization of a railroad company to take over and bond all the German railways, which we valued at 25,000,000,000 gold marks, or approximately, the equivalent of six billion dollars.

"C. The creation of an industrial bank and through it, the handling of a capital levy of five billion German marks or \$1,250,000,000 on German industry exclusive of agriculture.

"D. The creation of a revenue control, that is, taxes on tobacco, alcohol, beer and sugar, to be collected and applied on reparations, though these controlled revenues do not contribute to the annuity until the third year.

"The first year's reparations annuity is 1,000,000,000 gm., the second year's annuity is 1,220,000,000 gm., the third year's annuity is 1,200,000,000 gm. and the fourth year's 1,750,000,000 gm. And the fifth year's or standard year, which it is expected will continue, subject only to the prosperity index, will be the minimum from that time on and subject to increase in the prosperous years, is nearly 2,500,000,000 gm.

"The plan was submitted to the reparations committee and adopted in its entirety, including the suggestion for the evacuation of the Ruhr."

NATIONAL GUARD IS FIRST

LINE OF DEFENSE SAYS SECRETARY

WEEKS IN ADDRESS

PHILADELPHIA, Dec. 1.—The national guard was pictured as the first line of defense, "in the forum of public opinion" of questions relating to the national defense policy of the country in an address here today by Secretary Weeks at the convention of the National Guard Association.

The secretary urged officials of the association and members of the national guard to use their influence for preservation of "the balanced military policy," worked out in the national defense act and to defend the regular army from "chronic attack" through which attempts were made to reduce its strength year by year and thus cripple its efficiency.

If there is no regular army, or if that component (of the army of the United States) has been sapped by a long period of inadequate appropriations until it is insufficient for such a task (holding the first line of defense) the secretary pointed out, "the hastily expanded national guard will have to take the regular army's place in the front line and act as the covering force for the mobilization of the man power of the country."

"Then the officers and men of the guard will become the United States' first line of defense. That is the primary duty of insuring its own defense."
