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The presentation with musical accompaniment has been arranged by Dr. Hugo Riesenfeld, and a special symphony orchestra of twenty which is carried on tour will interpret his brilliant score.

The making of the epic occupied ten months on various west coast locales and the services of more than 5,000 persons. Mr. DeMille's spectacular exordium pictures the Exodus with a view of the "New Kingdom" of the Pharaohs, the escape of the enslaved children of Israel, and the work of Moses their deliverer in handing down the law and enforcing it against the orgiastic Golden Calf idolatry.

In the story of today, the producer sets his modern scene for one group of five characters, contrasting reckless ambition with integrity and sacred with profane love. The scene is San Francisco. The exotic east impinges on the barrier twist yellow and white. The eternal inescapable law conquers as in Moses' day, but its stern justice is tinged by the mercy of Jesus' hope and healing.

Theodore Roberts as Moses, Charles De Roche as Pharaoh, Estelle Taylor, James Neill, Lawson Butts, Julia Faye, Clarence Burton, assume the principal roles in the ancient story. The four leads of the modern are played by Leatrice Joy, Rod La Roque, Nina Naldi and Richard Dix, with Agnes Ayres in a short but beautiful episode.

This flare business is having quite a go this season. There is a very good reason. Every woman likes the straight slender lines for every dress. But sometimes, if the dress is too straight and narrow, there is not enough freedom for walking or dancing—so she keeps the straight lines to her knees and lets things flare from there.

Two more of these straight things with flaring bottoms are shown in the sketch above. The one at the left is entirely of gold

lace. Gold lace godets form the flare and give great additional width.

Needless to say, this gown would be lovely worked out in silver lace, or black lace over a flesh silk slip. But gold lace with its warm, yellowish tint is exquisite.

The frock at the right is charming. It is in a coral pink, and its border is of three rows of feather flouncing. One row a deeper shade than the other, so that the lowest row is a deep, luscious, warm coral.
