FARM BUREAU FED- ERATION MEETING

(Associated Press Local Wire.)
CHICAGO, Dec. 8.—The sixth
annual meeting of the American
Farm Bureau Federation opens
here today with some 700 dele-
gates in attendance. The ses-
sions will end Wednesday.
A feature of today's session
will be an open forum to be held
in the evening. The opening
will be by O. E. Bradfute, presi-
dent of the federation. Other
speakers will be W. S. Hill of the
shipping board and C. W. Hunt
of the federal reserve commis-
sion.

Forty-four state farm bureaus
and several hundred cooperative
marketing associations will be
represented.

Some day America will awake
to the necessity of owning and
controlling her ocean shipping,
Commissioner W. S. Hill of the
United States Shipping Board
told the federation.

"When that time comes, she
will establish a well equipped
and efficient merchant marine,"
he added. "I am also sure that
the farmer will be the first to
awake to this necessity if he will
study the question from the
standpoint of his advantage."

"It would seem to me wise to
awake to this necessity when
we have a large fleet of new,
modern steel ships that can
gradually be worked into our
carrying trade."
