SIMPLICITY IN GOVERNMENT.

President Coolidge thinks that his inaugural ceremonies on March 4 should follow rather modest lines, thus imitating President Harding's idea that his introduction to office should avoid the traditional pomp that has accompanied this event in the past. Monarchical governments like pomp and display, since it is said to impress the common people with the greatness and majesty of their power. Such a reason for ostentation is absent in a republican form of government. If organizations desire to join the inaugural parade at their own costs, and if the residents of Washington wish to put up money for display, there should be no objection. But the \$50,000 which the government appropriated to put Mr. Harding in office, would seem to be enough to place Mr. Coolidge in the presidential chair with all due dignity. The idea prevails among some people that there must be a big public demonstration, with elaborate decorations, and long parades of marching men, in order to emphasize the importance of a public occasion like this. But really important things do not have to be noticed in that way. Their importance does not have to be emphasized artificially. It makes itself felt naturally by the new ideas and the beneficial results that flow from such an event. The most earnest thinkers of these times feel that we need more simplicity. We all do things in too elaborate a way, with too much fuss and feathers and expense. A president of the United States does a good thing when he sets an example of simplicity. Mr. Coolidge is right in feeling that splendid demonstrations for the inauguration of a president are not called for.

Roseburg's main streets have been gaily decorated with evergreens, and at the corner of Jackson and Cass streets a huge Christmas tree is displayed and will be decorated with electric lights, thus adding a Christmas spirit that will be most pleasing. This is the sort of energy that makes the natives sit up and take notice and is a fine spirit to show at this particular period of the year.

STANFORD READY FOR NOTRE DAME

PALO ALTO, Calif., Dec. 10.—The Stanford football team, returning to practice this week, is preparing intensively for the encounter with the notable Notre Dame eleven at Pasadena, New Year's Day.

Ernie Nevers, premier fullback of the 1923 season, is expected to start the game. He was hurt in a pre-season scrimmage and has been skirting the side from on crutches most of the time since. He played part of two games but was injured again in the Montana contest and could not get into the big game with California. Blake Thomas, an end, is reported to have recovered from the injury that kept him on the bench most of the season. Forced to do without Nevers, Coach Glenn Warner has developed two more excellent fullbacks during the season, Ray and Boone. They are likely to step into the Notre Dame fray at some stage. Nevers' ankles are so weak that it is questionable whether he will play much of the game. Though Ray and Boone have proved smashing plungers, Nevers' powerful work on defense has been missed.

Warner is drilling the team especially for a defense against passes, anticipating Rocky air attacks. The Stanford teacher also is said to have evolved a few tricks for the special benefit of the Irish team.

BIG DEER DRIVE WILL BE FILMED

OGDEN, Utah, Dec. 10.—Arrangements for the driving of from 3,000 to 5,000 head of deer across the Grand Canyon from the Kaibab National Forest as part of the general scheme to alleviate stringent grazing conditions on the Grand Canyon game preserve, have been completed and the drive is expected to begin December 15, it was announced yesterday by R. S. Rutledge, district forester, upon receipt of a telegram from G. M. Willard, state game commissioner of Arizona.

The task is a huge one which has no parallel in the west and many have expressed doubt as to the feasibility of the plan. It is understood that motion picture rights to film the drive have been granted. Navajo Indians are to be used in the drive, Mr. Rutledge said.
