Everyone who is interested in social progress must have been made happy by the announcement a short time ago that two men of great wealth, James B. Duke and George Eastman, had made public gifts aggregating \$55,000,000, mostly to educational purposes. It is impossible to form any conception of the benefit that will come to the country by this superb offering. Thousands of young people who otherwise would have accomplished but little, will be enabled to develop their latent talents. They will go on to achieve achievement, with happiness for themselves and blessings to the community. These graduates of the institutions thus assisted, will be centers of inspiration and good citizenship. They will spread enlightened ideas in the communities where they settle. The principles that they help to communicate will help in lifting up the masses of the people and will turn them away from false ideas and low standards, and encourage higher and more intelligent aims. Mr. Eastman, in his statement accompanying his wonderful gift, made the very significant remark that "for some time past the accumulation of money personally has lost its importance to me." Yet that has not led him to abate his zeal or energy for his business. His first aims have become the welfare of the people who work for him. When a man of great wealth takes that point of view, he has reached a level far above that of ordinary money getting. He ought to be very much happier than those who simply earn money for their own benefits. Such an example ought to say to many other men of great wealth, that they would increase their own personal happiness and create a name for themselves that would be forever remembered, if they would "go and do likewise."

Medford—Fire destroys Hogue River Milling company plant here, worth \$25,000.

Klamath Falls—Voters authorize \$112,500 budget for city schools.

McMinnville—American Savings & Loan Association increases capital stock to \$500,000.

Eugene—Only six out of 34 road districts in Lane county failed to vote special road taxes for 1925.

Pendleton—Sale of 21,000 fescue for 1925, at prices from 40 to 43 cents, reported by Umatilla county wool growers.

Salem—C. J. Pugh, in motor, will build factory for fruit handling machinery.

The Dalles—J. G. Heimrich buys 255,000 feet national forest timber, and will build mill here to cut 70,000,000 feet a year.

Salem—\$133,000 already subscribed for \$150,000 Miles Linen company mill and business.

Portland—Oregon apple shipments to October 31st amounted to 1,200,000 boxes, with 550,000 more being prepared to ship. Douglas county has shipped 400 cars of broccoli, with 400 more on way to ship. Lumber for October was \$8,310,000 feet, and grain shipments were \$2,240,000 bushels worth \$4.60. Portland exports were \$8,000,000.

Marshfield—Orville Gibson of Contrilla, Wash., will start brickette plant here.

Salem—Walnut Growers' Association has sold all its 1924 crop for good prices.

Portland—Forest Service land allotted for survey of Western Elgin mountain highway in Umatilla county.

Astoria—\$70,000 worth of city 8 per cent bonds sold at a premium of \$1400.

Hood River—East Fork Irrigation district, watering large orchard tract, is first irrigation project in state to retire bonded debt.

Klamath Falls—1924 fire losses to Klamath county timber, \$44 per M. were \$24,000.

La Grande—St. Peter's Episcopal church ready for dedication.

Corvallis—Consolidated Stores Company will erect \$20,000 store building here.

Portland—Pacific Coast Company will increase plant to 625,000 cones daily.

Astoria—Exports for 11 months of 1924 were \$9,112,004, double those of 1923, with 1,818 vessels entering and 1,836 clearing the port in 10 months.

Warren—Two electric companies competing for contracts for electric light and power.

Bend—Radio program broadcast from Porto Rico was heard here by Mrs. H. L. Power.

Hillsboro—Washington county 1925 budget is \$378,862, \$350,000 to be raised by taxes.

Eugene—Building record for 11 months of 1924 is \$2,656,280 including 310 homes.

Albany—Mountain States Company given permit to build lines to Selo and Stayton to include city plant recently sold to them by city of Selo.

Klamath Falls—Telephone company adds new switchboard and builds new line to Pelican.

Wheeler—Sunset Cooperative Fish Company buys waterfront land for fish station.

Portland—Exports of dried apples for November totalled 272,450 pounds.

Astoria—Suit to be brought to test mandatory provision of law requiring state to spend \$2,500,000 on Roosevelt highway, since federal expenditure on 50-50 basis already exceeds \$2,500,000.

Marshfield—Coos Bay Steam Laundry moves into new \$100,000 plant, rebuilt after fire.

Salem—R. C. Reese of Prairie City applies for power permit on Strawberry Creek, Grant county to develop 1278 h. p.

Portland—Work to begin at once on \$1,000,000 mausoleum in Mt. Scott Park cemetery.

After a trial of less than a year, the people of Oregon voted to repeal the state income tax, which imposed a graduated levy on incomes from \$1,000 upward.

The tax officials are now trying to collect from \$700,000 to \$1,000,000 state income tax which they claim is due, or was due, on the last quarter of the year for which they collected the first three-quarters. The attorney general holds that these unpaid taxes are collectable. The matter will probably be carried to the supreme court.

The Interior Department budget as submitted to congress provides for abolishing 39 western land offices, at Blackfoot, Coeur d'Alene, and Hailey, Idaho; Billings, Bozeman, Glasgow, Great Falls, Kallis, and Lewistown, Montana; Alliance, Nebraska; Burns, and La Grande, Oregon; Bellefourche, S. D.; Vancouver, Walla Walla, Waterville and Yakima, Wash.; Cheyenne and Newcastle, Wyo. It provides allotments for reclamation work as follows:
