Judge and Mrs. Fullerton Celebrate Golden Wedding

A golden wedding anniversary, hallowed by time and fifty years of love and companionship, was observed December 16, by one of Roseburg's oldest and best known couples, Judge and Mrs. J. C. Fullerton.

The respect and affection in which this venerable couple are held in Roseburg would have been demonstrated much more fully had it not been for the rather feeble health of Judge Fullerton which forbade any large gathering, several old and intimate friends calling to congratulate them and a family dinner at noon being the only events of the day, aside from a long distance call from Oberlin, Ohio, from their daughter, Kate, Mrs. T. W. Graham. They were able to hear her perfectly, and to chat easily with both Mr. and Mrs. Graham. Mr. Graham is dean of the Graduate School of Theology at Oberlin, and owing to the distance they were unable to spend the anniversary with Mrs. Graham's parents. The day was doubly significant to Judge Fullerton, as it was also his birthday anniversary.

The life and work of Judge Fullerton is synonymous with the growth and history of Roseburg and he is one of the few remaining who are able to reminisce of the days when the town of Roseburg was merely a dream and nothing existed here but what he terms a "mud flat." Judge Fullerton was born in Ohio and came to Douglas county by ox-team at the age of four with his parents, who settled on a homestead at Canyonville. His father was one of the first sheriffs in Douglas county. When a young man Judge Fullerton was connected with the land office at Roseburg for several years, leaving that to practice law, serving many years as judge of the circuit court. He is also a Civil War veteran. Many pages would be necessary to tell of the varied activities that have filled Judge Fullerton's life.

Mrs. Fullerton was born in Wisconsin coming to Roseburg in 1872 with her family. She came in a rudely constructed coach attached to a freight train, and as there was no station then, they were landed about where the foot of Douglas street now is. They had come to Oregon to escape the rigorous Wisconsin winters, and the day they arrived in Roseburg the sun shone and flowers were in bloom. They made an immediate decision to stay here, and as Mrs. Fullerton says now, they "were never sorry." She married Mr. Fullerton in 1874, and there are at least two residents of Roseburg now living who attended their wedding, George Kimball and Mrs. Charles Hadley. Rev. W. A. Smick, whose widow is still living here, read the ceremony that united them in marriage. Hon. Binger Hermann was also here at that time.

Of the five children born to Judge and Mrs. Fullerton, there are only two remaining, Nathan Fullerton, proprietor of the Huxall Drug Store at Roseburg, and Mrs. T. W. Graham, of Oberlin, Ohio. Five ten dollar gold pieces, one for each ten years, were the gifts of the children to their parents. Other gold pieces were received from other relatives.

REASONS GIVEN FOR ADDING TERRITORY TO CITY

Editor Roseburg News-Review: "We bow to the majority," as Bill Nye said after his political defeat. "We met the enemy, and we are hater." Yes, we have no school, but will have later. Now let me give a few reasons why we should join hands with Roseburg.

First—Fifteen hundred people will be added to Roseburg's several thousand inhabitants. The prestige given our county would be reflected in increased values of property. In union there is strength.

Second—The reduction in insurance premiums would approximate 40 per cent with the last word in modern fire equipment. Third—Police supervision, electric lighted main travel arterials, eight hydrants to insure water and pressure to combat any fire anticipated.

Fourth—The increased area proposed to be taken in would add \$404,166.33 in taxable property to the aggregate. Then we could sit easy. Just think, a carrier delivering mail at your door.

Fifth—The per capita of Roseburg is \$5.40 and the city indebtedness is \$11.40 per capita. The city tax is only nine and a fraction mills; the least of any town or city in the county. I have before me a copy of the 1923 tax roll summary and it is ours I am indebted to the county officials, and the courtesy of Mayor Houck. We have nothing to lose and everything to gain in joining Roseburg's extension. We would be eligible to have our council representative on the city council. Regarding sewers, we are badly in need of them.

I could enumerate fifty other reasons why we should join Roseburg, but defer. A meeting and educational affair will be held at Edenbower in the school room soon, where data and proposed city boundaries will be explained. Let us all turn out and hear the facts.

BLIND, Ore., Dec. 20.—While both mills at the Brooks-Scanlon lumber company started full blast this morning despite cold and falling snow, the Shovelton mill had not started up at 9:30 although it was expected that work would begin within a short time.

Both mills have been hindered during the last five days by ice on the mill pond on which it was necessary to use dynamite. A committee of the Four L. declared an emergency existed and voted to allow the mills to work the men overtime on straight pay. Taking advantage of this the night shift which usually report off duty at three a. m. have been working until seven o'clock and the day shift going on an hour later. In this way the mill pond, once opened, has been in almost constant use during the day.
