grazed the side of my jaw." Bystanders were crowding around the alleged murderer as his voice rose. Deputy Clyburn had left his prisoner alone with the interviewer.

"Well, when he hit me twice, I just turned and shoved him backwards. He was dead drunk and lost his balance, falling in a corner. They say I pulled a knife. I did not. I didn't see a knife. That is about all I remember. I left the house and on my way out saw Sullivan doing something with the halter of his horse. I left him there.

"Drinking as I had been, I did not think to stop at Clyburn's house and tell him to attend to Nolan. You see I was afraid that Nolan, drunk as he was, would freeze to death while in an intoxicated slumber. Instead I waited till next morning and then sent my boy, Wesley, over to Park Dyer's to tell him that maybe Nolan needed a doctor.

"That is about all I know about it. I am innocent and if convicted they will hang a man who had no hand in the murder of John Nolan. I am willing to answer to any charge they might file against me. I come through Oregon on my way to California without extradition because I know I am innocent of this crime."

Deputy Clyburn left on this morning's train with his prisoner for Yreka. A coroner's jury was to have met today to determine the cause of Nolan's death. A warrant for Howard's arrest will doubtless be issued upon his arrival in Yreka, Calif.

"Bullet" Joe Bush, Yankee pitcher, sent to St. Louis in the trade by which New York gets Urban Shocker was a greater nemesis to the Browns than Shocker was to the hughmen. Records reveal that Bush conquered the Browns in 17 consecutive games he pitched against them over a period of three years. He beat them seven straight in 1922, six times in 1923 and four in a row last season before the Browns finally broke the streak. Shocker, on the other hand lost his jinx hold on the Yankees' last season, losing five games to them while winning only two.

DINING CAR OF TRAIN PLUNGES INTO RIVER

hurtled through the air it turned over and plowed into the murky waters on its back, leaving its trucks exposed and one of two windows just above the water line.

CHIPPEWA FALLS, Wis., Dec. 20.—The rear coach of a Soo line passenger train, Minneapolis to Chicago, fell from the bridge of the Chippewa river here at noon today. The fire department and all available ambulances have gone to the scene. It is said several persons were killed but this is not confirmed. There were between 15 and 20 passengers in the coach. It is said.

MINNEAPOLIS, Dec. 20.—The general offices of the Soo line here received word from Chippewa Falls today that the rear coach of the Minneapolis-Chicago train plunged from a trestle near Chippewa Falls, Wis. No details were given. The train left here at 7:45 a. m. today.

CHIPPEWA FALLS, Wis., Dec. 20.—Five persons are known to have been drowned in the Chippewa river here today when the dining car of a Chicago bound Soo line passenger train hurtled into the river after being derailed. It is believed a switch bolt was snapped by the intense cold. It is thought that 12 persons were in the car. Seven were rescued.

MINNEAPOLIS, Dec. 20.—A wrecking train in charge of General Superintendent Urbans left here today for Chippewa Falls. It was announced by officials of the Minneapolis, St. Paul and Sault Ste. Marie railway here.

Another wrecking train left Stevens Point, Wis., in charge of Division Superintendent W. W. Wate.

The hospital list of injured as given to The Associated Press did not include any one from west of Sioux City.

The gates of the Wicota dam three miles up the river, were ordered closed as soon as the news of the wreck reached the water level and enable searchers to definitely determine if other bodies are held in the wreckage.

One of the first bodies removed was that of a baby, but up to 2:30 p. m. no identification had been made. Those who witnessed the efforts of those who tried to escape from the river said that two men went down while trying to swim ashore after breaking their way from the car. One unidentified man and a woman are among the dead.

Four persons were taken from the wreckage by members of the fire department while others, including three negro porters, gained the shore in safety.

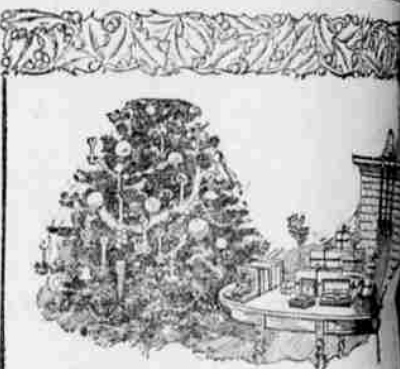
