OPPOSE INCLUSION OF DIAMOND LAKE

PORTLAND, Dec. 19.—Protest against any effort of the government to include Diamond Lake in Crater Lake national park was made today in a letter sent President Coolidge by I. N. Fleischer, chairman of the state game commission.

The letter was authorized by the commission following recommendation by Secretary Work of the interior department and Stephen T. Mather, director of national parks, for inclusion of Diamond Lake. Part of the letter follows:

"On motion by Commissioner Davis seconded by Commissioner Price, it was ordered that the commission address a letter to President Coolidge with a copy to the government officials concerned and the Oregon delegation in congress protesting against the inclusion of Diamond lake in Crater national park.

"Commissioner E. W. Price, who seconded this motion, is the manager of the Crater National Park hotel and the transportation commission and should be entirely familiar with the advisability of increasing the area of Crater National park by including Diamond lake and surrounding territory.

Diamond lake was originally barren of fish life and has been developed by the state of Oregon through the propagation program of the Oregon state game commission until at the present time it is the most valuable, individual asset under the game commission's supervision.

"This lake not only provides the best lake fishing in the state of Oregon but produces an annual output of rainbow trout eggs valued at more than \$30,000; in other words, this lake provides a sufficient amount of rainbow trout eggs with which to stock all the streams in the national forests of the state of Oregon to which use they are being put at the present time.

"Diamond lake has no particular scenic value, not differing in appearance from any other Cascade mountain lake, and the state of Oregon must insist on having jurisdiction over this body of water in order that it may continue as an available supply of rainbow trout spawn for Oregon's lakes and streams.

"We respectfully request in behalf of the state of Oregon an opportunity of presenting to you all the facts in the premises before any definite steps are taken which would forever prevent the state from having any jurisdiction over the use of Diamond lake and the disposition of its products."

INVENTION AIDS DEAF

(Associated Press Special Wire.) WASHINGTON, Dec. 22.—Perfection of a method of communication for deaf persons by which they will "feel" the spoken word and sentences is the object of an experiment being conducted by Professor Robert H. Gault of Northwestern University at Gallaudet college near here. Professor Gault said today he would "have most encouraging" progress to report in a paper to be read at the convention next week of the American Association for the Advancement of Science.

The "idea" he said in explaining the result of his work at Gallaudet, is to communicate vibrations of speech mechanically to a sensitive skin area where spoken words and sentences may be felt.

In the course of forty sessions of a half hour each, five of fifteen deaf persons have got to the point of being able to identify twenty sentences each, and aggregating sixty different words.

SAYS OFFICIALS MUST SPIN YARN

(Associated Press Special Wire.) BELGAUM, British India, Dec. 22.—Mohandas Gandhi, who is president elect of the annual Indian national congress opening on Friday, has stipulated as a condition to retaining leadership that every congressman must spin two thousand yards of yarn monthly.

One of the objects of the non-cooperative movement headed by Gandhi is boycott of foreign cloth and encouragement of home spinning.

Gandhi has been conferring with those representatives who have hitherto opposed Indians entering the various legislatures with a view to persuading them to make a pact with the Swarajists, whereby this boycott of the legislative bodies and also of the law courts and schools would be suspended. He is said to have won 209 of the 212 delegates to his view.

LEGION POST OUTLINES PLANS

GIVENS' WATCH AND KEYS ARE FOUND

A watch and bunch of keys which have been identified as the property of A. Givens, who was quarantined in a hospital of 2000 men by Flood Hospital, were found last week near the cabin, where Givens resided, and about 15 feet from where the covered and muffled body of the parakey was discovered. Hence, it was brought out in the trial when Givens' name, and then piled west and has on top of the body, returned the pile with keys, and set fire to it. Hence, at all times during the trial the watch and keys which Givens' name, and which would not be found, caused persons investigating the case to doubt Givens' guilt. The watch and keys were found by the young son of J. E. Krebs. The watch was hanging on a bench, and the keys were on the ground, badly rusted. They are now in the possession of Late Krebs, and will be turned over to the sister of the dead man. However, who was found guilty of the slaying, was given a life sentence, but being brought out at the time that his sanity was such that he was incapable of distinguishing right from wrong. He is in the Oregon penitentiary.
