FORBES-THOMPSON CONSPIRACY TRIAL CONTINUED TODAY

(Associated Press Legal Wire.)

CHICAGO, Dec. 29.—Major Frederick L. Martin, commander of the army world fliers at the outset of the flight, was called as a witness for the defense today at the resumption of the Forbes-Thompson Veteran's Bureau conspiracy trial.

Charles H. Forbes, former director of the Veteran's Bureau and J. W. Thompson, wealthy Chicago and St. Louis contractor, are on trial for alleged conspiracy to defraud the Government through Veteran's Bureau hospital contracts.

Major Martin, the first witness for the defense after a seven-day Christmas recess was questioned as to the general reputation in Washington of Elias H. Mortimer, chief government witness and formerly contractor, agent in veteran's hospital negotiations with Forbes.

He had known Mortimer since 1920, the witness said. He testified Mortimer's reputation for truth and veracity was bad, and affirmed that Mortimer was known in Washington as a "clever fixer."
