NEW ARRIVAL BUYS CITY PROPERTY

A. S. Coen, a recent arrival in Roseburg from Los Angeles, has made a large number of purchases of industrial property in this city. Mr. Coen, in looking about for a city where investments would be safe, and sure to yield good returns, decided upon Roseburg, and has been making a number of very important purchases. He bought out all of the holdings of R. M. Wadell, securing several timber claims, a saw mill at Sugar Pine, and a number of home building contracts in the city. He is completing the construction of the houses started by Mr. Wadell, and is carrying out all of these contracts.

In addition he has purchased 8 lots in North Roseburg adjoining the Page lumber yards, the land being the property of the old Brown Lumber company. He has also secured the railroad, taking in the old power plant and the lots in that block, the purchase being made from the California Oregon Power company and from Fred Stevens. He has been dealing through the firm of Rice and Rice in securing this property, which he is holding for future development and speculation.

PRUNE EXCHANGE SELLS 400,000 PRUNES IN N. Y.

(Associated Press Special Wire)
PORTLAND, Dec. 30.—The North Pacific Prune Growers Exchange has announced the sale of their entire prune pool, amounting to approximately 400,000 pounds to New York buyers. The prunes were packed in 25 pound boxes and brought the following prices, f. o. b. dock:

30-40's 12 cents; 40-50's 21 cents; 50-60's 23-4 cents; 60-70's 24 cents; 70-80's 25 cents; 80-90's 26 cents; 90-100's 27 cents; 100-120's 28 cents.

The sale is particularly significant at this time coming during the quiet period of the year when very little activity is shown.

Another large sale was consummated by the exchange a few days ago when nearly 450,000 pounds of Italian prunes was sold at regular exchange prices and in some cases a fraction above the regular quotation.

Rumors have been circulated that the exchange is cutting prices. This is emphatically denied by local officials who state that the exchange is standing pat on the prices agreed upon by the board of directors and furthermore they intend to remain firm on these prices.

M. J. Newhouse, manager of the exchange is in Liverpool looking into the frozen prune situation and endeavoring to develop the demand for Pacific Northwest prunes.

TOWING SERVICE TO BE PROVIDED FOR STATE ROADS

EUGENE, Dec. 30.—Establishment early next of a free towing and emergency road service in Eugene for the members of the Oregon State Motor Association is being planned by the organization as a part of the association.

"This service, for motorists will be planned geographically so that there will be stations at least every twenty miles along the heavily traveled roads," Mr. Brandenburg stated in explanation of the plan which has already been started at Portland with the opening of the first station here at 7:34 o'clock last night.
