LITTLE DRINKING AT CELEBRATIONS

(Associated Press Local Wire.) NEW YORK, Jan. 2.—Four dead, a score hurt and more than a hundred patched up in local hospitals made up the toll of New Year's celebrations in New York, a check of police records revealed.

Two deaths were traced to poison liquor, one to a street brawl and the fourth to an automobile accident that occurred during the reveling.

The group of those arrested for intoxication was the smallest since the advent of prohibition.

The death of one of the victims of bad liquor at Bellevue Hospital brought a total of 28 deaths from the same cause during the past 15 days in that institution.

Most of those injured participated in brawls or were automobile victims.

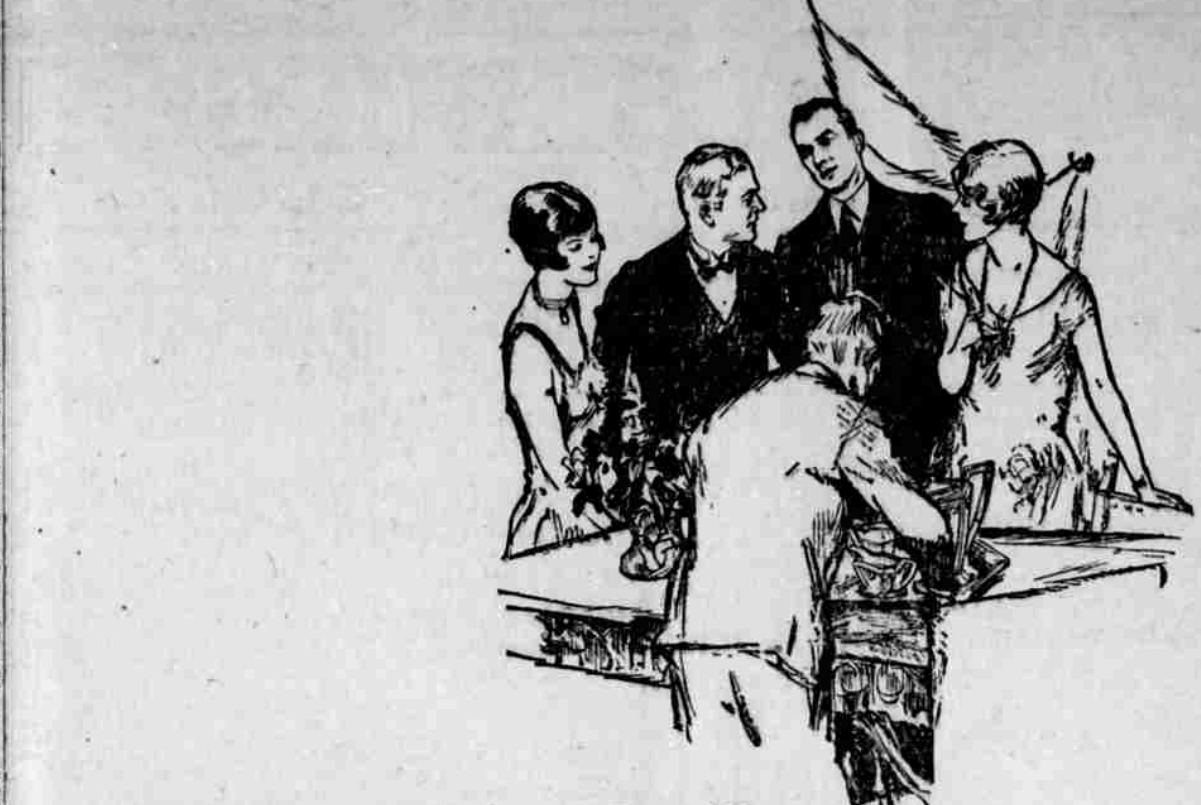

FORMER EMPRESS GETS HOMESICK PARIS, Jan. 2.—Former Empress Zita of Austria-Hungary has appealed to the ambassador's council for permission to return to Hungary with Crown Prince Otto and her family, to reside on the crown domain at Godollo, according to a dispatch from Budapest.

She asserts it is necessary that Otto should be in Hungary when the King is chosen, and adds that the peace treaty does not forbid his return. Zita has just received \$100,000 from monarchist friends in Hungary which she has deposited in a Spanish bank the dispatch says.
