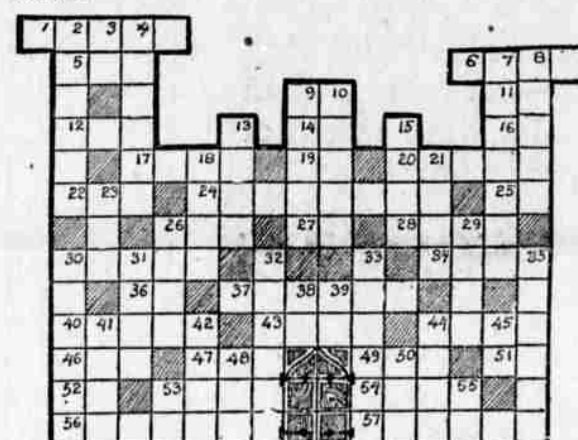

PRECEDENT SET BY COURT RULING.
(Associated Press Local Wire)
SALEM, Ore., Jan. 2.—Because F. A. McDaniel is held by the Supreme Court to have been searched illegally by Deputy Sheriff, the court today reversed Judge G. F. Skipworth of the lower court for Benton county in the case of the state against McDaniel, appellant, who was convicted in the lower court of having intoxicated liquor in his possession because the search is held to have been illegal in that it was made prior to McDaniel's arrest for a crime and without a warrant, it is held that the liquor could not be used as evidence in the prosecution, the opinion was written by Justice Pipes. Justices Bean and Rand concur. Justice Brown concurs in the result. Justice Coshaw writes a dissenting opinion in which Chief Justice McBride and Justice Burnett concur in the result. These differences make the decision of the court four to three. The Coshaw dissent holds that the manner of making the arrest is foreign to the issue involved in the trial and that the only and sole issue is the guilt or innocence of the defendant. The opinion is believed to set a precedent in the Supreme Court relative to the search of a person.

CIVIL WAR AMNESTY.
PEKIN, Jan. 2.—The Chinese government has proclaimed a general civil war amnesty, especially excepting, however, former President Tsao Kun and his parliamentary followers.
