# ROBBERY LOOT RECOVERED

MEMPHIS, Tenn., Jan. 1.—With \$21,000 in liberty bonds—said to be part of the spoils given Herbert Holliday for his part in the \$2,000,000 Roundout, Ill., mail robbery in their possession, post office inspectors today were on the trail of an additional \$80,000 and were also hunting for two men alleged to have been implicated in the concealment of Holliday's share of the loot.

Meanwhile Holliday's wife, Mrs. Ellen Holliday, 22, and his niece, Helen McNeill, 18, were on their way to Little Rock, where the \$21,000 find was made, in the custody of postal agents. Both denied knowledge of the whereabouts of the bonds, it was stated.

It was learned today that the missing men had been traced to Memphis, thence to Little Rock and later to Kansas City, but there the trail was lost.

Thus far a total of \$1,125,000 of the Roundout robbery loot has been recovered in various cities. In addition to Holliday eight men were convicted of implication in the holdup and were sentenced to prison.

## U. S. MARINES ARE LANDED IN NANKING

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)

SHANGHAI, Jan. 2.—It is reported that a detachment of American marines has been landed at Nanking to protect the foreign residential district, following the looting by the bodyguard of General Chi Shieh Yuan, former military governor of Kiangsu, of a number of large silk stores in the city, causing a loss of \$80,000. General Chi is a refugee here in Shanghai.

TIEN TSIN, Jan. 2.—General Liu Ching-Lin recently appointed military governor of Chihli province and protégé of General Chang Tso-Lin, Manchurian leader, has given the commanders of troops in the area where soldiers raided a train on last Tuesday until next Monday to find the culprits. The commanders will be executed then, if the guilty are not found. Lin says, adding that he will pay losses of foreigners as a result of the holdup.

# SCIENTISTS HEAR FINE ADDRESSES

WASHINGTON, Jan. 2.—Persons alarmed by reports of a light cooling off of the sun a year ago were assured there was no imminent danger of another ice age in papers included among the scores prepared for today's sessions of the American Association for the Advancement of Science.

Dr. A. P. Coleman, of the royal Ontario Museum of Toronto and Professor W. J. Humphreys of the United States Weather Bureau agreed that there had been no evident advance toward conditions believed to be the cause of previous ice ages.

Glacial periods of the past can be best accounted for, Professor Humphreys believed on the assumption of great changes in land levels. Glaciers would descend the mountains and, with the moderating influence of the sea shut off and possible volcanic dust reducing the sun's heat, heavy snows would remain until an ice age had set in.

The conclusion that ice eras were more frequent at one time than in recent geologic epochs was presented in Dr. Coleman's paper, which reviewed evidence that the earth in general seems to be warming up.

Production of sugar from dahlias as a commercial possibility was discussed in a paper prepared from chemical section by Dr. A. F. Jackson, of the bureau of standards. Sugar in the Levulose form, which is sweeter than other sugar, can be produced by a new crystallizing process from both dahlias and artichokes, he said.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 2.—Wm. J. Bryan, whose dissent from the theory of the evolution of man came in for discussion in a paper read at the current meeting of the American Association for the Advancement of Science, became a member of the association today.

Bryan's check for the \$5 membership fee was received by mail. There was no indication that the new member expected to attend the present sessions.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 2.—Tornadoes in the United States during the eight years ending with 1923, caused the loss of 1,929 lives and the destruction of more than \$63,000,000 worth of property. These figures were reported in a paper prepared for the session of the American Meteorological society today by H. C. Hunter of the United States Weather Bureau. "More twisters" were responsible in Arkansas than in any other state, 78 having occurred there during the eight year period. Those having the most were:

Kansas, Texas, Iowa, Missouri and Oklahoma.

The total number for the whole country was 762.

# N. UMPQUA ROAD WORK PROGRESSING

The North Umpqua road has been graded to a point about three miles inside the boundary, according to Contractor R. S. Hartwell, who was in Roseburg today. A crew of nine men will be maintained during the winter months, providing the weather enables them to continue work, and the rock work, and all other operations concerned in the grading which are possible under weather conditions will be taken care of, so that the road may be finished into Steamboat as early as possible in the spring. It is hoped to have it open by the time the forest fire danger becomes serious next year.

During the recent weeks the weather has not been favorable and little has been accomplished. The heavy rains in October effectively halted all grading, except rock work and the snow and cold of the past month forced a discontinuance of all work temporarily.
