EXILED RHODE ISLAND SOLONS ARE REINSTATED

Republican Senators Return to Power After Bitter Political War.

GET PARTY APPROVAL

Voters Call Back Legislators Who Left State When Gas Loosed in Senate Chamber.

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)
 RUTLAND, Mass., Jan. 3. — Self-exiled Rhode Island republican senators are going home today. The exile which began after the release of bromide gas in the senate chamber on June 19, ended when the general assembly adjourned yesterday after a session which began on January 1, 1924.

Worn out by the strain of the filibuster conducted by the democratic minority, in which protracted sittings were common, the last of 52 hours, and during which disorder several times occurred with threats of personal violence, 21 of the 22 republicans left the senate. They established themselves here in a hotel and many of their families soon followed and the hotel became almost completely a sub-station of the Rhode Island capital. The "exiles" organized themselves into a close-knit community.

The senators led a life in the open, which rested their physical vigor. The hotel became the focal point to the town. The party organized a Fourth of July celebration which dwarfed anything previously in the town. They provided the orators, composed half of the parade and outshone everyone in fireworks. The local storekeepers adapted their stocks to the senator's tastes, the moving picture shows, dances and sporting events swelled their audiences with visitors from Rhode Island.

And yet, the hotel was almost a community in itself. Twice death visited it and once a marriage was performed, when a daughter of one of the senators transferred her ceremony to Rutland, so that her father might attend. Thanksgiving a gigantic dinner was served the senatorial family, on Christmas a tree bore gifts for all, and on New Year's Eve the four-story building twinkled lights from every window until the clock in the village church nearby boomed its announcement of the New Year.

Meanwhile, in Rhode Island, the affair in which the senators had been leaders, went on without them. Elections were waged at long range. Thirteen of the twenty-two, (several had not run again) were returned to office in the republican landslide, which swept the state. Now with the stamp of approval placed on their course by the voters, they enter Tuesday on a new executive year.
