RECLAMATION OF 10 YEARS PAST IS BIG ACHIEVEMENT

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)

CHICAGO, Jan. 5.—The farmer's fight against flood waters and swamp hazards and measures for aiding him in land development were discussed today by land owners, engineers, financiers and representatives of farmer organizations in the open session of the thirteenth annual convention of the national drainage congress.

Taxation, legislation and development methods and a score of technical questions will be considered.

C. H. Young, president, asserted in a paper that more than 55,000,000 acres of land had been reclaimed in the United States by drainage projects with an investment of approximately \$455,000,000. Approximately 10,000,000 acres subject to improvement through drainage still are to be found in the country, he said. The average cost of all drainage projects was a little more than \$5.50 an acre and the average increase in land value through drainage was more than \$35 an acre.

GREAT WAR FLEET OFF FOR PACIFIC

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)

NORFOLK, Va., Jan. 5.—Thirty warships comprising the Atlantic division of the United States fleet were gliding and shipshape for their departure from Hampton Roads today for winter maneuvers off Guantanamo. For many of the destroyers, submarines and fleet auxiliaries accompanying the four battleships of the group it meant the last sight of North Atlantic ports for months, as they will later journey through the Panama Canal to join the Pacific division for the Hawaiian maneuvers beginning in April.
